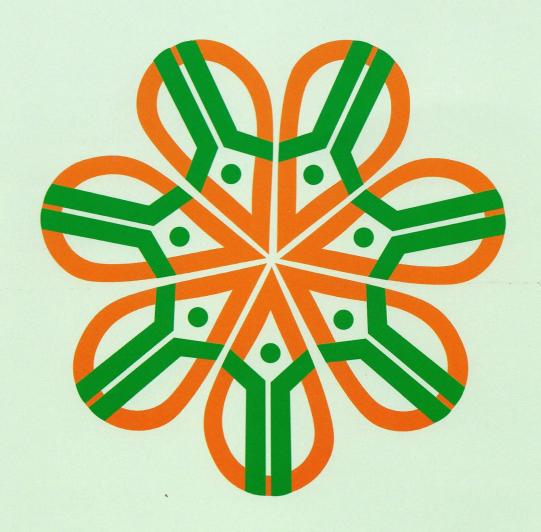

## **ANNUAL REPORT 2007-08**

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#### INTRODUCTION

The National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH) is an autonomous organisation with the Ministry of Home Affairs. It was registered on the 19th February, 1992 under the Societies Registration Act of 1860. Its office is located on the 9th Floor, 'C' Wing, Lok Nayak Bhawan, Khan Market, New Delhi-110003.

#### **Objects**

- 2. The objects of the Foundation are to:
  - i) undertake such programmes or projects for providing assistance to the children of families affected by communal, caste, ethnic and any other form of violence/clashes which fracture social harmony, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time, in particular for their education and/or vocational training;
  - ii) undertake such programmes or projects for assisting in the physical and psychological rehabilitation of the children, families or other victims of communal, caste, ethnic and any other form of violence/clashes which fracture social harmony, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time, and in their assimilation into the mainstream of society;
  - iii) promote, or undertake activities for the promotion of communal harmony and national integration including, but not limited to, scholarships, fellowships and studies;
  - iv) promote or undertake activities which will highlight and strengthen the bonds of unity and affinity between different religious and other groups in the country;
  - v) undertake and encourage activities which will promote belief in the principles of non-violence in resolving disputes between different religious and other groups in society;
  - vi) institute awards or rewards for outstanding contributions to the cause of communal harmony and national integration;
  - vii) cooperate with, and secure the cooperation of, the Central Government, State Governments, Union Territory Administrations, industrial and commercial organizations, and non-governmental, voluntary and other organisations and bodies in promoting the objects of the Foundation;
  - viii) provide information services, set up libraries, bring out journals, books or other forms of literature to promote the objects of the Foundation; and
  - ix) do all such other lawful acts and things as may be necessary or conducive for furthering the objects of the Foundation.

#### **ORGANISATION AND MANAGEMENT**

3. The Foundation has two main constitutional bodies, namely, the Governing Council and the Executive Council. While the Governing Council formulates overall policies, the Executive Council is responsible for the management and administration of the Foundation. The Governing Council has 24 members with the Union Home Minister as its chairman (Appendix-A). The Executive Council has 8 members, with the Union Home Secretary as the chairman (Appendix-B). The Secretary of the Foundation is the principal executive officer of the Foundation. One meeting of the Executive Council was held during the current year.

#### **Funds**

4. The Government of India provided a corpus fund of Rs.10 crore to the Foundation on its constitution. The corpus fund was raised to Rs.11 crore in 2004 following merger of Communal Harmony Fund of Rs.1 crore (excluding interest of Rs.2.00 crore approximately earned on this fund) with the corpus fund of the Foundation. To augment its resources, the Foundation issues appeals to the general public, various government departments, public sector undertakings, educational institutions and others for donating funds on voluntary basis to the Foundation for its noble cause. All donations to the Foundation are eligible for 100 per cent deduction under section 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961. The Government of India have vide Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances & Pension (Department of Personnel & Training) O.M.No.11013/9/95-Estt (A) dated 2.11.1995, relaxed the provisions of rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 to allow central government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis. (Annexe-I). Similar relaxation has also been given by few state governments/ union territory administrations allowing state government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis. These include governments of Goa, Himachal Pradesh, Punjab, Kerala and Sikkim.

## **ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAMMES**

- 5. Initially, the focus of the Foundation's efforts was on taking care of children whose families had been affected by communal violence and providing assistance for maintenance and education of such children. In 1997, it was decided that the definition of violence should also include violence due to incidents involving ethnic, linguistic and caste issues. In 1998, it was decided that assistance could also be extended to child victims of terrorist violence. Thus, the major activity of the Foundation is to implement programmes and projects for assisting in the physical and psychological rehabilitation of children, families or other victims of communal, caste, ethnic, terrorist and any other form of violence/clashes which fracture social harmony. The emphasis, however, remains on providing assistance to such children for their education and/or vocational training.
- 6. The existing programmes of the Foundation have been classified into five categories, namely, (i) Project Assist, (ii) Project Recognition, (iii) Research and Fellowships, (iv) Library and Publications, and (v) Extension activities, as explained hereunder.

## **Project 'Assist'**

- 7. Under the project, financial assistance is provided to children who become orphan or destitute due to death or permanent incapacitation of both the parents or the surviving parent or the main bread earner in the family in communal and other forms of violence and who are below poverty line. Each identified child is provided enhanced financial assistance @ Rs. 800/- per month in class 'A' & 'B' cities and Rs. 750/- per month at other places with effect from 01.04.2006 as against the earlier scale of Rs.750/- per month at urban areas and Rs.600/- per month at other places, without any restriction in regard to number of children in a family. The assistance covers items like text books, stationery, food, clothing, health care and recreation. The assistance is normally given till the child attains the age of 18 years. In highly deserving cases, it is extended upto the age of 21 years.
- 8. A sum of Rs. 4.94 crore was incurred on project 'Assist' during the financial year covering 4429 children. 440 new eligible children were identified and provided assistance as against 369 new eligible children who were identified and provided assistance during 2006-07. A total of 9,535 children have been benefited under the project 'Assist' from the year 1992-93 to 2007-08 (Annexe-II). Year-wise number of assisted children is at Figure 1. Year-wise accretion of children



assisted by the Foundation is at Figure 2. Out of 9,535 children, 2,492 children have crossed the age of 18/21 years and consequently become ineligible for assistance. So far a total expenditure of Rs.24.36 crore has been incurred since the inception of the scheme on assistance to child victims. Updated year-wise expenditure on this project is at Figure 3. State-wise distribution of assisted children is at Figure 4.

9. The Foundation also seeks cooperation from non-governmental and other organisations for identifying eligible child victims for consideration of their proposals for grant of financial assistance. Five such organisations with which the Foundation is in touch are (i) The Rajiv Gandhi Foundation, New Delhi, (ii) The Council for Rehabilitation of Widows, Orphans, Handicapped and Old Persons in Jammu and Kashmir, and (iii) Aashwas, a unit functioning under the Assam Police, (iv) Jan Shikshan Sansthan, Jorhat, and (v) Society to Save Victims of Violence and Terrorism, Kokrajhar in Assam. Under its Project 'Interact', the Rajiv Gandhi Foundation has been providing financial assistance since 1993 to the children who have lost their parents in terrorist attacks in states like Jammu and

Kashmir, Punjab, Andhra Pradesh and states in the North East. The Rajiv Gandhi Foundation, however, provides assistance upto two children in a family (even if there are more than two children in the family who require assistance). The Rajiv Gandhi Foundation was, therefore, requested to forward to the National Foundation for Communal Harmony, the names of the additional children who require assistance and have not been considered for financial assistance by the Rajiv Gandhi Foundation. The Council for Rehabilitation of Widows, Orphans, Handicapped and Old Persons has been helping the Foundation in identifying child victims of terrorist violence in the state of Jammu & Kashmir. Self Employed Women's Association (SEWA), Ahmedabad is also taking active part in identifying such children in Gujarat.

- 10. Immediately after release of assistance by the Foundation, the affected families are informed to get timely payment through the respective collector/district magistrate/deputy commissioner. With a view to fostering closer emotional bonds, the Foundation sends Greetings to the assisted children on various occasions like birthday, on the eve of their annual examination, Independence Day, season's greetings (New Year) and various festivals like Id, Deepawali and Christmas. In addition, letters are sent to children just after declaration of annual results to boost their morale, advising them to take active part in co-curricular activities and sports for their all round development.
- 11. Insurance cover with the following benefits has been provided to all children who are getting assistance under the scheme:

(E) Reimbursement of medical expenses incurred by a child for treatment in 500/a hospital or nursing home and as an indoor patient for an injury sustained in an accident (based upon medical certificate from the consulting doctor)

## **Project 'Recognition'**

12. Two annual national awards have been instituted, one for an individual and the other for an organization, for outstanding contribution in promoting communal harmony and / or national integration. The awards carry a citation each and cash amount of Rs. 2 lakh for an individual and Rs. 5 lakh for an organisation. From the year 2007, another award for Students' Union category containing a citation and cash amount of Rs. 3 lakh has been introduced. Selection for the awards is made by a jury presided over by the

Vice President of India. An advertisement, calling for nominations for the awards for the year 2007, was inserted in May, 2007 in 48 leading newspapers in different languages. In addition, nominations were also called for from 2,316 sources. Besides, the Chairman of the Executive Council the Home Secretary addressed a letter to all the chief secretary for sponsoring names of suitable/eligible individuals/organizations. The Ministry of Information and Broadcasting gave wide publicity to the said scheme on the television through its kendras. Setu Charitable Trust, Maharashtra was selected for the award in the category of an organization and Shri Ram Puniyani of Maharashtra in the individual category.

## **Research and Fellowships**

13. Proposals for study/research are being invited from time to time from universities, research organisations, schools of social work, autonomous organisations, media persons, renowned institutions working in the field, individuals, etc. for empirical, participatory and action-oriented research and other studies having strong relevance to promotion of communal harmony and strengthening of national integration.

14. In order to encourage study and research in promoting communal harmony, a scheme for undertaking research in study of field situation in communally sensitive districts was introduced during 2001-02. Three fellowships with a duration of two years were approved. Applications for grant of fellowships for the year 2007-08 have been invited. One proposal was received on "Traditional Ties between Hindus and Muslims in Tamil Nadu: A Socio- Political and Economic Interdisciplinary Study" from an NGO of Chennai, which is under examination in the Foundation.

## **Library and Publications**

- 15. The Foundation has established a library and has got approximately 2800 books, journals and reports, all on the subject of communal harmony and national integration. This is one of the richest libraries in the country on the relevant subject. The literature available in the library is being used by the staff of the Foundation and regularly consulted by professionals/scholars/students having interest in the subject. Setting up of a library has facilitated carrying out research work on various aspects of communal harmony and national integration.
- 16. During the financial year, the Foundation has published *Samaji Hum Ahangi Aur Maashee Taraqee* in Urdu (Translated version of Social Harmony and Economic Development) on communal harmony and national integration.

#### **Extension Activities**

17. The Foundation, through its programmes namely 'Reach', 'Milan', 'Samanvaya' and 'Cooperation', is promoting communal harmony and national integration.

#### **Project 'Reach'**

18. The scheme envisages provision of financial assistance in the States /Union territories upto Rs.2 lakh per annum for activities aiming at promotion of communal harmony and national integration. The programme envisages organisation of debates, seminars, workshops, painting, poster/slogan and essay writing competitions, music, cultural programmes, mushairas, etc. either directly by the state governments / union territory administrations or through non-governmental organisations.

#### Project 'Milan'

20. The scheme envisages financial assistance of upto Rs.40,000/- per festival per annum for three festivals in a State and Rs. 20,000/- per festival per annum for three festivals in a UT for organising inter-community milan on festivals like Id, Deepawali and Christmas, preferably through non-governmental organisations.

## Projects Cooperation and Samanvaya

21. The scheme envisages financial assistance of upto Rs.20,000/- per festival for two festivals per state and one festival per union territory in a year for associating with important inter/community festivals like 'Phool-Walon-Ki-Sair' in Delhi, Deva Sharif in Barabanki and 'Nauchandi' in Meerut preferably through non-governmental organisations with a view to promoting better understanding, communal harmony and national integration.

## **Essay Competition**

22. In collaboration with the National Foundation for Communal Harmony, the Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi organized essay competition on the theme of communal harmony and national integration. Besides, the UGC Academic Staff Colleges organize such competitions in their orientation courses for participating teachers and selected essays are sent to the Foundation for publication. Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel National Police Academy, Hyderabad, and the central police organisations also organize similar essay competitions in their training courses on the topic of communal harmony and national integration and prize winning essays are often sent to the Foundation. Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel National Police Academy organized an essay competition on "Religious fundamentalism and communal harmony". Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie also organises similar competition every year in collaboration with the Foundation. Prize winning essays are sent to the Foundation for consideration of publication on merit. Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie organized essay competition on the topic "Creation of vote bank is hindrance to the unity of country" in its 81st foundation course during the year 2007-08.

## Sadbhavana Clubs

23. The Foundation has so far helped in establishing more than 6000 Sadbhavana Clubs in Kendriya Vidyalayas, Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalyas and educational institutions in some communally hypersensitive districts viz. Meerut, Kanpur, Barabanki in Uttar Pradesh, Haridwar in Uttaranchal, Jaipur and Bhilwara in Rajasthan, Bangalore (Urban) and Bangalore (Rural) in Karnataka, Nasik and Jalgaon in Maharashtra, Nagaon and Morigaon in Assam and Delhi (East) and Delhi (North-East). Efforts are being made to sensitize young students about the problems of communalism, terrorism, casteism etc. and their impact on social disharmony. The objective is to inculcate values of harmony,

fraternity, brotherhood, tolerance, co-operation and non-violence in children, which help in promoting peace, unity and social harmony.

#### Internet, web-site and e-mail

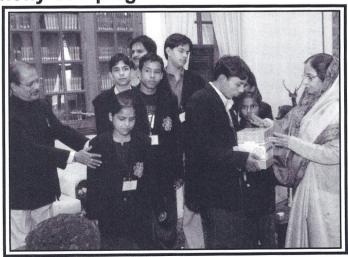
24. The web-site of the Foundation (www.nfch.nic.in) initially launched during 2002-03 is being updated on regular basis and is fully operational. The web-site is visited/accessed by about more than 40,000 of individuals/scholars/ academicians/ social activists and organizations. The required information about the Foundation including its current activities, details of assisted children including financial assistance, books in the library, publication, application forms for grant of assistance under various projects, information regarding National Communal Harmony Awards and its application form, etc. is available on the web-site. The e-mail facility is also being used to contact district and state authorities to expedite information for release of assistance to child victims under the Project 'Assist' and for other purposes.

#### Staff

25. The Foundation has total staff strength of 22 personnel. The work relating to accounts, including issue of receipt for donations, project 'Assist' and library has since been computerized.

## **Communal Harmony Campaign**

26. As per past practice, the communal harmony campaign week was observed from the 19th to 25th November, 2007 to coincide with the Quami Ekta week. An appeal was made to the general public, state governments/union territory administrations, ministries/departments, para-military forces, public sector undertakings, embassies/missions abroad, educational institutions etc. to donate funds on voluntary basis to augment the financial resources of the Foundation.

27. The Foundation had printed publicity material and distributed the same to State Govts./ Union Territories, Ministries/ Departments of Government of India, Central Public Sector Undertakings, para-military organisations, Universities, educational

institutions and our diplomatic missions abroad. In all, publicity material was sent to 35,463 units as against 36,191 units during the year 2006-07. Details of dispatch of publicity material to various units during 1992-93 to 2007-08 are at Figure 5.

- 28. Communal Harmony Campaign and fund raising week was observed throughout country in educational institutions, professional, technical and management institutions, ministries/departments of central and state governments and union territories and also in Indian missions abroad with enthusiasm. Cultural programmes, debates, seminars, symposia, slogan, painting competitions and marathon involving children of various communities with an aim of spreading communal harmony and national integration were organized in which large number of students, teachers, parents and employees participated. Rallies with banners were also organized as part of celebrations. Reports of celebrations have been received from almost all states/union territories.
- 29. The highlight of the observance of the Flag Day on 23.11.2007 was symbolic pinning of flags by a group of assisted children from Assam, Gujarat and Jammu and Kashmir on the President, Vice President, Prime Minister and the Union Home Minister.

#### **Donation**

30. Total donation of Rs. 217.43 lakh was received during 2007-08 as compared to Rs. 143.23 lakh during the year 2006-07. Year-wise break up of donation received from 1992-93 to 2007-08 is at Figure 6.

## **ACCOUNTS AND AUDIT**

- 31. The rules of the Foundation provide for the maintenance of proper accounts and other relevant records. The Foundation is also required to prepare an annual statement of accounts and get it audited by a chartered accountant or a firm of chartered accountants approved by the Governing Council.
- 32. M/s Y. Agrawal & Co., New Delhi have audited the accounts of the Foundation for the year. The accounts and auditor's report are placed at Annexe III.

## **SUMMING UP**

- 33. To sum up, the Foundation continued to carry out its activities with unabated vigour. The year under report witnessed an increase in the number of children assisted from 9,095 to 9,535 under project 'Assist'. A total expenditure of Rs. 4.94 crore was incurred on project 'Assist' during the year 2007-08.
- 34. Setu Charitable Trust, Maharashtra and Shri Ram Puniyani, Maharashtra were selected in organization and individual categories respectively for the National Communal Harmony Awards for the year 2007. Various extension activities were undertaken to spread the message of communal harmony. The Foundation has its own Library with approximately 2800 books, journals and reports. Web-site of the Foundation is being updated on regular basis and is fully operational for the public at large for obtaining requisite information about the Foundation.
- 35. The financial position of the Foundation is satisfactory and its funds are managed judiciously. The fixed deposits of the Foundation stood at Rs. 38.70 crore as on 31.03.2008.

## **OFFICE MEMORANDUM**

Subject: Observance of Flag Day by the National Foundation for Communal Harmony-Participation of Government Servants-CCS (Conduct) Rules, 1964.

Under Rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 no Government servant shall, except with the previous sanction of the Government or of the prescribed authority, ask for or accept contribution to or otherwise associate himself with the raising of any funds or other collections in cash or in kind in pursuance of any object whatsoever.

The National Foundation for Communal Harmony has been set up for promoting communal harmony and particularly for the physical and psychological rehabilitation of children rendered orphans and destitutes in communal violence. The Foundation has been engaging in efforts to collect contributions and observes every year a 'Fund Raising Week', and 'Flag Day', clarifications have been sought whether Central Government Servants could be associated with or involved in the above fund raising efforts of the Foundation.

The matter has been examined and keeping in view the objectives of the National Foundation for Communal Harmony, the Government of India have decided to relax the provisions of Rule 12 to allow Central Government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING CONVENTION

- **1.1** The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention and in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles and standards.
- 1.2 The Foundation generally follows the accrual method of accounting, unless otherwise stated.

#### 2. INVENTORY VALUATION

- 2.1 There are no items of inventory for goods produced or traded.
- 2.2 No value is recognised for promotional books lying in stock.

#### 3. INVESTMENTS

- 3.1 There are no Ear-marked Funds. Corpus and Surplus funds are kept invested in medium term government securities of bank FDRs (shown as "Investment-Other) to generate fixed income (interest) to take care of Assistance to Children and other expenses.
- 3.2 Investments are stated at cost. Interest accrued thereon is shown under "Loans, Advances and other Assets".

#### 4. FIXED ASSETS

- **4.1** Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition inclusive of inward freight, duties and taxes and incidental and direct expenses related to acquisition.
- **4.2** There are no Fixed Assets received by way of non-monetary grants.

#### 5. DEPRECIATION

**5.1** Depreciation is provided on straight-line method as per rates specified in the Schedule of Fixed Assets on the basis of estimated useful life of the asset. Depreciation is charged to the extent of

90% of the asset value on the assumption that the estimated realizable value of the asset shall be found about 10% of its cost.

- 5.2 Since there is no business activity and minimal assets are acquired, full year's depreciation is charged in respect of additions to fixed assets during the year and no depreciation is charged in respect of deductions during the year. There is no material impact of this Policy as compared to pro-rata computation of depreciation.
- **5.3** Assets costing Rs. 5,000 or less each are fully provided.

#### 6. GOVERNMENT GRANTS/SUBSIDIES

- **6.1** Government grants of the nature of contribution towards capital cost of setting up projects are treated as capital reserve.
- **6.2** Grants in respect of specific fixed assets acquired are shown as a deduction from the cost of the related assets.
- **6.3** Government grants/subsidy are accounted on realisation basis.

#### 7. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS

- **7.1** Transactions denominated in foreign currency (like contributions from foreign countries) are accounted at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of the transaction.
- **7.2** There are no foreign currency assets or liabilities.

#### 8. RETIREMENT BENEFITS

- **8.1** Liability towards gratuity payable on death/retirement of employees is provided for on accrual basis. However no such provision was made till previous year and to this extent there is change in polity.
- **8.2** Similarly provision for accumulated leave encashment benefit to the regular employees is created on accrual basis. However no such provision was made till previous year and to this extent there is change in policy.

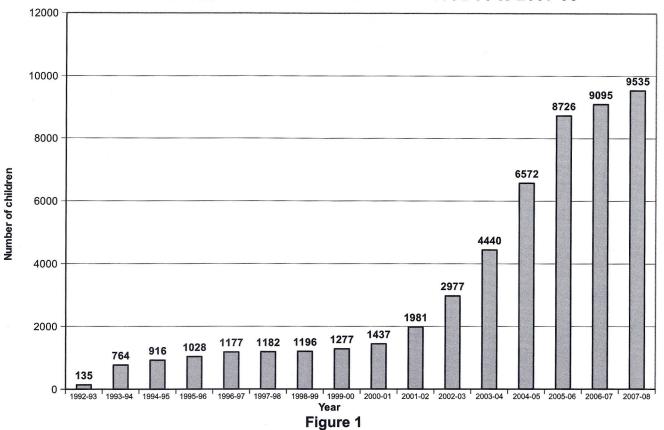

Year wise accretion of assisted children from 1992-93 to 2007-08

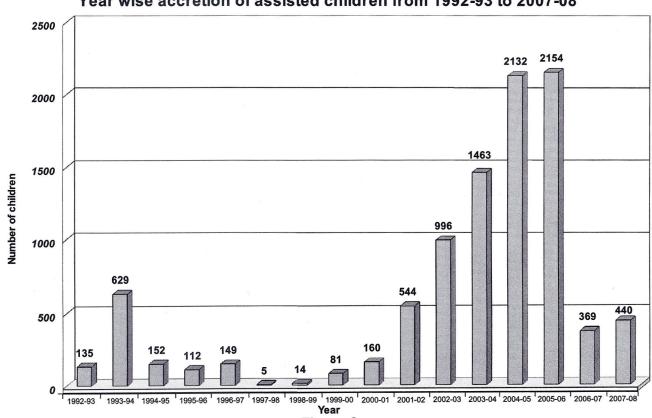
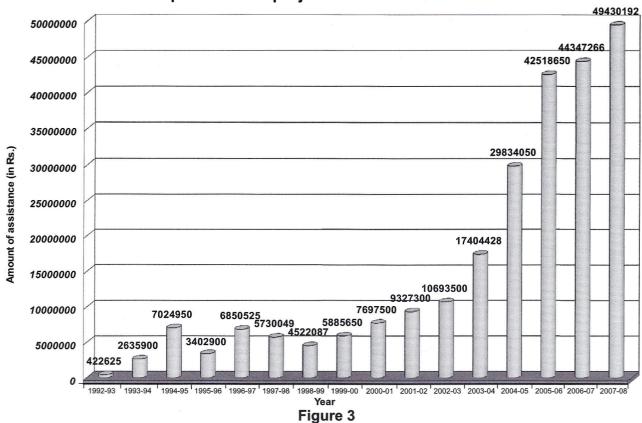

#### State-wise distribution of assisted children as on 31.03.2008

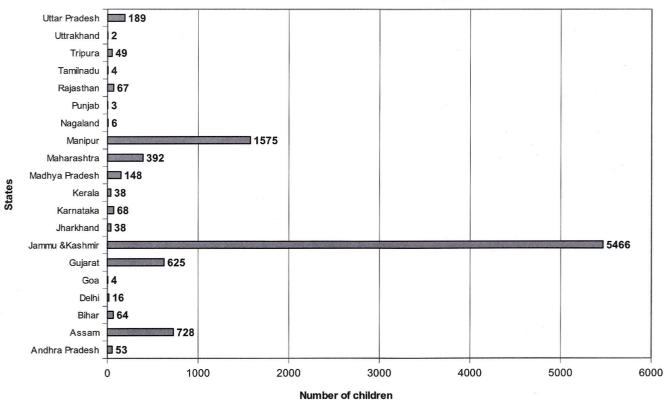
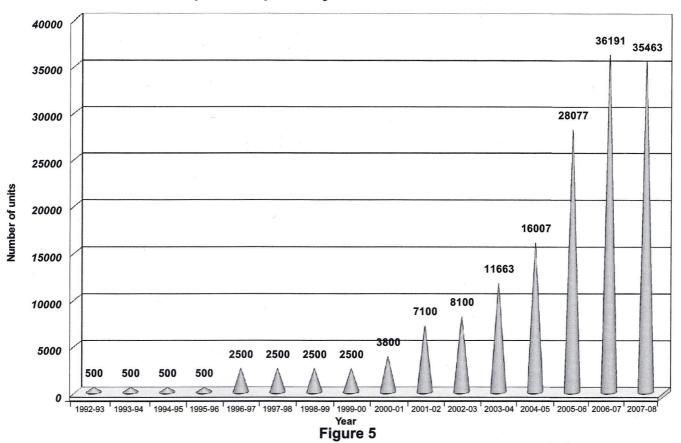
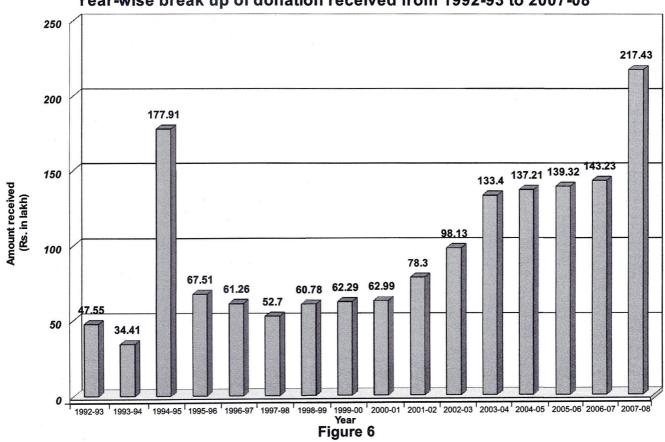
