INTRODUCTION

National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH) is an autonomous organization with Ministry of Home Affairs Government of India. It was registered on 19th February 1992 under Societies Registration Act, 1860. Its office is located on the 9th Floor, 'C' Wing, Lok Nayak Bhawan, Khan Market, New Delhi-110003.

Objectives

2. The objectives of the Foundation are

- (i) To undertake programmes or projects for providing assistance to children of families affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence which fractures social harmony, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time, in particular for their care and education;
- (ii) To undertake programmes or projects for assisting in physical and psychological rehabilitation of children, families or other victims of communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence / clashes which fracture social harmony for their assimilation into the mainstream of society, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time;
- (iii) To promote or undertake activities which highlight and strengthen bonds of unity and affinity between different religious and other groups in the country;
- (iv) To undertake and encourage activities which promote belief in principles of non-violence in resolving disputes between different religious and other groups in society;
- (v) To institute awards for individuals as well as institutions for outstanding contributions to the cause of communal harmony and national integration;
- (vi) To cooperate with, and secure cooperation of Central Government, State Governments, Union Territory Administrations, industrial & commercial organizations, non-governmental, voluntary & other organisations and bodies in promoting the objectives of the Foundation;
- (vii) To provide information services, set up libraries, bring out journals, books or other forms of literature to promote the objectives of the Foundation;
- (viii)To do all such other lawful acts and things as may be necessary or conducive for furthering the objectives of the Foundation.

ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

3. The Foundation has two main bodies to carry out the objectives set out for the Foundation, namely, the Governing Council and the Executive Council. While the Governing Council formulates overall policies, the Executive Council is responsible for the management and administration of the Foundation. The Governing Council consists of not more than 25 members to be nominated by Ministry of Home Affairs with Union Home Minister as its Chairman (Annex-V). The Executive Council has eight members, with Union Home Secretary as its Chairman (Annex-VI). The General Body has been constituted for the first time by the Ministry of Home Affairs vide order dated 2nd August 2017 (Annex -VII). The Secretary of the Foundation is the Principal Executive Officer.

Funds

4. Government of India provided a corpus fund of Rs.10 crore to the Foundation on its establishment in 1992. The corpus fund was enhanced to Rs.11 crore in 2004 following merger of Communal Harmony Fund of Rupees one crore with the corpus of the Foundation. To augment its resources, the Foundation makes appeal to general public, State Governments / Union Territory Administrations, Central Government Departments, Public Sector Undertakings / Enterprises, educational institutions etc. for voluntary donations to the Foundation for its noble cause. All donations to the Foundation are fully exempted from Income tax under section 80G (2) (iii) (e) of the Income Tax Act, 1961. The Government of India vide Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances & Pension (Department of Personnel & Training) O.M.No.110 13/9/95-Estt (A) dated 02.11.1995 has relaxed provisions of rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 to allow Central Government servants to participate in fund raising efforts of the Foundation on voluntary basis (Annex-I). Similar relaxation has also been given by few State Governments allowing State Government servants to participate in fund raising efforts of the Foundation on voluntary basis. These include governments of Goa. Himachal Pradesh, Punjab, Kerala and Sikkim.

ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAMMES

- 5. The major activity of the Foundation is to implement programmes and projects for assisting in effective rehabilitation of child victims of communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence which fracture social harmony. The emphasis remains on providing assistance to such children for their education and promoting communal harmony and national integration through various promotional activities.
- **6.** Existing programmes of the Foundation may be categorized as:

- Project 'Assist'
- Project 'Recognition'
- Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day
- Project 'Research'
- Library & Publications
- Extension activities and Know My India Programme
- Other activities

Brief about these programmes is given hereunder:

PROJECT'ASSIST'

- 7. Under project 'Assist', financial assistance is provided to children, who become orphan or destitute due to death or permanent incapacitation of either both the parents or the main bread earner in the family in communal and other forms of societal violence. The children whose family income is up to Rupee Two Lakh per annum are eligible for financial assistance under the project. Each identified child is provided financial assistance Rs.1,250 per month up to class XII; Rs.1,500 per month for the students doing graduation / post-graduation and Rs.1.750 per month to students of professional courses (like medical, engineering and management), without any restriction on the number of children in a family. The assistance is provided till the child attains the age of 25 years.
- 8. A total of 12,855 children have been benefited under project 'Assist' from the year 1992-93 to 2018-19 (Annex-II). Year-wise number of assisted children is given at Figure-1. Expenditure of Rs.84.50 Crore has been incurred since the inception of the scheme on assistance to child victims, as on 31.03.2019. A sum of Rs.5.60 Crore was incurred on project 'Assist' during the year 2018-19, covering 3,337 children (Annex-II). Up-dated year-wise expenditure on this project is at Figure-2. During 2018-19, 470 fresh cases were approved and 2867 cases renewed for grant of assistance under Project Assist. Year-wise accretion of children assisted by the Foundation is at Figure-3. State-wise distribution of assisted children is at Figure-4.
- 9. Proposals of eligible children, either fresh or for renewal, are received through district administration. These proposals are examined and processed by the Foundation, thereafter; the assistance for the children is released through the concerned District Collectors / Magistrates / Deputy Commissioners etc. for further disbursement to each child. Immediately after release of assistance by the Foundation, the affected families are informed to get timely payment through the office of the respective District Collector / Magistrate or Deputy Commissioner.
- 10. The Foundation also seeks cooperation from concerned State Governments, District Administrations

and other organizations for identifying eligible child victims for consideration of proposals for grant of financial assistance. In Assam, a unit under Assam Police, namely "Aashwas" is helping the Foundation in identifying child victims of violence. Similarly, in J&K, 'Council for Rehabilitation of Widows, Orphans, Handicapped & Old Persons' is facilitating the Project in the State. In addition, State level Nodal Agencies have been identified in the States of Bihar, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh.

Project 'Recognition'

11. Two National Communal Harmony Awards have been instituted to be conferred annually, one for an individual and another for organizations for outstanding contribution in promoting communal harmony and national integration. The awards carry a certificate & cash amount of Rupees Five Lakh for individuals, and a certificate & cash amount of Rupees Ten Lakh for organizations. Selection for the awards is made by a Jury presided over by Hon'ble Vice President of India.

Communal Harmony Campaign Week

- 12. Communal Harmony Campaign Week was observed as an annual feature from 19th to 25th November 2018 to coincide with Qaumi Ekta week. On the occasion, an appeal was made to general public, State Governments / Union Territory Administrations, Ministries / Departments, Public Sector Enterprises, Embassies / Missions abroad, para-military forces, educational institutions, etc. to effectively promote values of communal harmony and national integration amongst the people. The appeal inter-alia emphasized to donate funds on voluntary basis to augment the financial resources of the Foundation to enable it to carry out its activities.
- 13. The Foundation got publicity material printed and distributed to State Governments / UT Administrations, Ministries/Departments, Central Public Sector Enterprises para-military organisations, educational institutions, etc. In all, publicity materials were sent to about 1.21 Lakh units all over the country during the year 2018 as against about 1.25 Lakh units during 2017. Details of dispatch of publicity material to various units during 1992-93 to 2018-19 are at Figure 5.
- 14. The week was observed throughout the country with great energy and passion. As per the appeal made by NFCH, the Foundation received reports that different activities and programmes were organized by educational institutions, etc. during the Week to promote the ethos of communal harmony and national integration. The educational institutions throughout the country organized debate competitions, painting competitions, essay competitions, rallies, etc. during the week. A large number of selected paintings, essays, etc. were sent to the

Foundation by the schools/educational institutions. Some of these paintings have been displayed in the Annual Calendar 2019 of the Foundation to encourage the creative efforts of the children. The Week's last working day i.e. 22nd November 2018 (Thursday) was observed as the Flag Day throughout the country. This was specially utilized to generate financial support for destitute children affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence.

15. Six children, two from Jammu & Kashmir and one each from, Gujarat, Manipur, Bihar and Chhattisgarh were invited by the Foundation along with their mothers/guardians and escorts (State Government representatives) to participate in Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day celebrations from 19th to 25th November 2018. These children viz. Surject Kumar and Zafar Ullah Javid from Jammu & Kashmir; Yogeshwar Solanki from Gujarat; Km. Muktiyas from Manipur; Sravan Kumar from Bihar; and Km Kritika Yalam from Chhattisgarh were privileged to meet, greet and stick communal harmony flags on the dignitaries of Shri M Venkaiah Naidu, Hon'ble Vice-President of India; Shri Rajnath Singh, Hon'ble Union Home Minister; Shri Hansraj Gangram Ahir, & Shri Kiren Rijiju, Union Ministers of State (Home) and Shri Rajiv Gauba, Union Home Secretary during the week.

- 16. These children were also taken to local sight-seeing in Delhi and nearby places of historical, religious and cultural importance i.e. Rashtrapati Bhawan, India Gate, Qutub Minar, Lotus Temple, Raj Ghat, Lal Quila, Jama Masjid, Akshardham Temple, etc. They were very excited to see these places and immensely enjoyed their Delhi visit. It was a lifetime experience for these children. The children were enthused to intermingle with their fellow friends coming from different states for this occasion.
- 17. The Foundation is immensely grateful and appreciates the efforts made by all stakeholders, supporters and well wishers for organizing such programmes and raising funds for the destitute children covered under its Project 'Assist' and also for enhancing the activities of the Foundation.

Project 'Research'

18. Proposals for study / research are considered from universities, research organisations, schools of social work, autonomous organisations, renowned institutions working in the field, individuals, etc. for participatory and action-oriented research and other studies having strong relevance to promotion of communal harmony and strengthening of national integration.

Library and Publications

- 19. The Foundation has established a library and has approximately 3300 books, journals and reports on the subject of communal harmony and national integration. The literature available in the library is being used by the officials of the Foundation and is consulted by professionals/ scholars/students from time to time. Setting up of the library has facilitated carrying out research work on various aspects of communal harmony and national integration. Details about books and journals are available in the library and also on the website of the foundation https://nfchlibrary.nic.in.
- **20.** The Foundation has brought out a number of publications including e-books, books and monographs. List of publications of the Foundation is at Annex-III.

The library of the Foundation is updated on e-Granthalaya 4.0, which is developed by National Informatics Centre, Ministry of Electronic and Information Technology.

Extension Activities

- 21. The Foundation under Extension Activities viz. Reach, Interfaith-Interaction, Partnership and Cause Partnership takes up various activities either independently or through State Governments / Administrations, non-governmental organizations, educational and other institutions etc. with a view to promote communal harmony and national integration. Financial assistance is provided by the Foundation to State Govts., NGOs, educational and other institutions for organizing activities for promoting communal harmony and national integration.
- 22. Under the scheme 'Reach', there is a provision of providing financial assistance of up to Rupees Five Lakh per annum per State/UT for organizing various activities aiming to promote communal harmony and national integration in the concerned States / UT. The programme envisages debates, seminars, workshops, paintings, poster / slogan and essay writing competitions, music, cultural programmes, mushairas, etc. either directly by the State Governments / UT administrations or through nongovernmental organisations.
- 23. Scheme Interfaith-interaction envisages financial assistance up to Rs.50,000 per festival per annum for two festivals in a State/UT for organizing inter-community interaction on festivals like Eid, Deepawali, Christmas, Vaisakhi, Lohri, Onam, Pongal and festivals / fairs such as Phool Walon Ki Sair in Delhi, Deva Sharif fair at Barabanki and Nauchandi fair at Meerut in Uttar Pradesh through non-governmental organizations, colleges, universities, etc.

- 24. Scheme Partnership has provision of partnering with (a) UN organizations, (b) different Government organizations (like NYKS, NSS etc.) and (c) renowned All India level VOs/NGOs for furthering the objectives of the Foundation. Maximum annual provision for this scheme has been kept at Rs.5 lakh out of the total budget for the Extension Activities per year.
- **25.** Scheme Cause-Partnership provides that the Foundation may associate itself with other Government Departments, UN organizations, educational institutions or VOs/NGOs to promote communal harmony and national integration without any provision of financial assistance.
- 26. The Foundation organized a round table conference on 'Interfaith Dialogue for Prosperity in the Country' on 29th August 2018 at Dy. Chairman Hall, Constitution Club of India, Rafi Marg, New Delhi to spread the message of communal harmony & strengthening national integration. The conference was presided by Shri Syed Ghayorul Hasan Rizvi, Chairman, National Commission for Minorities. The programme was attended by eminent religious and faith leaders, Members of Governing Council of NFCH, Members of General Body, NFCH, representatives of civil society organizations, academicians and scholars. The invited speakers shared their thoughts and views on the relevance of the theme during the Conference.

- 27. The Foundation collaborated with Sikkim University, Gangtok, for organizing one day National workshop on theme 'Walk for Global Peace and Interfaith Dialogue for Social Harmony' under Project 'Reach' on 21st September 2018 at Sikkim University, Gangtok. The programme was organized at Mannan Bhawan, MG Road, Gangtok. Secretary, NFCH was invited as Special Guest on the occasion.
- 28. The Foundation collaborated with Christ University, Bangalore for organizing two days National Conference on "Models of Interfaith Dialogue in

Conflict Resolution and Peace building" under Project 'Partnership' from 24th to 25th September 2018 at Bangalore. Secretary, NFCH was invited as Guest of Honour during inaugural session of the conference.

29. 'New India Sankalp' programme organized by Doordardshan on 19th November 2018

In continuation of celebration of Communal Harmony Campaign Week in the country, Doordarshan, Delhi invited Secretary, NFCH in a live TV interactive session "New India Sankalp" on 19th November 2018 to emphasize the importance of this occasion and other initiatives to achieve the noble objectives of the Foundation. Secretary, NFCH explained about various initiatives undertaken by the Foundation and shared the future plans and activities to be undertaken by the Foundation.

- **30.** For observing Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day 2018, ASN Senior Secondary School, Mayur Vihar-I, Delhi organized special programme for assisted children at ASN School premises on 20th November 2018. These children were felicitated during the programme. The event provided a platform for interaction between students of the school and invited children. The programme was presided over by Shri Manoj Pant, Secretary, NFCH; and the participants shared their valuable thoughts on the theme. About 500 school children from different communities assembled on the occasion.
- 31. NFCH supported Nadd Foundation, New Delhi to organize a series of festival of music titled 'Concert for Harmony' at different places to spread the message of peace and harmony. Under the Foundation's Project 'Partnership', the programmes of music viz. 'Concert for Harmony' were organized at Kolkata on 09.12.2018, Vadodara on 16.12.2018 and New Delhi on 20.02.2019.

32. NFCH organized Inter School competitions in collaboration with Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti

NFCH collaborated with Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti for

conducting essay, story writing and painting competitions amongst children of 588 Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas at school, cluster, regional and national level in the country to promote communal harmony and national integration. NFCH provides cash prizes along with certificates to winner children of various competitions.

- 33. NFCH officers visited Jammu & Kashmir for review of Project Assist from 12th to 14th December 2018. Secretary, NFCH and DDO,NFCH visited Baramula, Kupwara and Srinagar Districts in Jammu & Kashmir from 12th to 14th December 2018 and interacted with beneficiary children under Project 'Assist', their guardians and the concerned district authorities. Progress of Project "Assist' was reviewed with State Government officials.
- 34. NFCH officers visited Manipur & Assam for review of Project Assist from 18th to 22nd December 2018. Secretary, NFCH and DDO, NFCH visited Imphal West & Senapati Districts in Manipur and Kamrup Metropolitan & Baksa districts in Assam for interaction with beneficiary children under Project 'Assist', guardians and concerned district authorities. Chief Manager (CSR) & General Manager, Power Grid Corporation of India Limited were also present during the interaction.

Directorate of Information, Govt. of Manipur organized a press conference at Civil Secretariat, Imphal, Manipur on 19th December 2018. Many media persons (print & electronic) attended the press conference. Secretary, NFCH briefed the media about activities of the Foundation and details of implementation of Project 'Assist' in Manipur.

Secretary, NFCH and DDO, NFCH called on Dr J Suresh Babu, Chief Secretary, Govt. of Manipur on 20th December 2018 and briefed him about the activities of the Foundation and programmes in Manipur. On 22nd December 2018 Secretary, NFCH and DDO met Shri B.J. Mahanta, Addl. DGP, Assam Police and the Advisor 'AASHWAS' at Guwahati. Secretary NFCH briefed him about the progress of Project 'Assist' in Assam.

35. An agreement was signed with GAIL India Limited for providing financial support of Rs.50.00 lakh to the Foundation under Project "Assist" under CSR initiatives.

- The Foundation supported Vivekananda Education Society, Kanakkary, Ettumanoor, Kottayam, Kerala under Project 'Reach' to organize one day programme titled '125th Year celebration of Swami Vivekananda Chicago Speech' to spread Communal Harmony within the larger society' in relevance of communal harmony and National integration. The programme was organized on 12th January 2019 at Nandavanam Auditorium Ettumanoor, Kottayam, Kerala. The programme aimed to bring about national integration, peace, unity and development among the people of India with special emphasis on assisting destitute children who have become orphans due to communal riots and terrorist activities. The programme was very successful in motivating young people to understand communal harmony in a wider context as narrated by Swami Vivekananda.
- **37.** The Foundation in collaboration with Office of Resident Commissioner, Government of West Bengal and Nadd Foundation, New Delhi organized **All Faith Prayer Meet and Concert for Harmony** to observe Martyr's Day of Mahatma Gandhi at Muktadhara Auditorium, Gole

Market, New Delhi on 30th January 2019. Students from 08 different schools participated in the programme. The event provided a platform for interaction between students of various communities and faiths. The students presented teachings and prayers of Hinduism, Islam, Jainism, Buddhism, Zoorastrism, Christianity and Sikhism. The Concert for Harmony, a musical tribute was also performed by the artists of Nadd Foundation during the occasion. Winners were felicitated with prizes and Certificates. The programme was presided over by Shri Bhasker Khulbe, Secretary, Prime Minister Office, Shri Manoj Pant, Secretary, NFCH; Resident Commissioner, Government of West Bengal and Additional Resident Commissioner, Government of West Bengal. About 100 school children from different communities assembled on the occasion.

- 38. The Foundation organized "Know My India Programme 2018-19" in collaboration with Art of Living Foundation (AOL), Bengaluru at AOL International Campus, Bengaluru, Karnataka from 4th to 8th February, 2019. The programme was an integrated effort of the Foundation to acquaint the varied and diverse culture of the country to the children, who are receiving financial support from the Foundation for pursuing their education. There were 38 children, 13 escorts and 05 NFCH officials who participated in the programme. The concept of Know My India Programme is to bring together these children from different States and regions at one place to promote oneness, fraternity and national integration. Art of Living Foundation is amongst the largest Civil Society Organizations of the country known for its all-inclusive approach and work in the area of humanitarian development. The programme was a unique experience for children as they were taken to historical, educational, entertainments, religious and cultural places in and around Bengaluru. The participants also visited Mysuru. This was an unforgettable and memorable experience for the children. On the concluding day, a cultural performance by the children including folk dances and folk songs of their States was presented. All participants were awarded certificates.
- 39 The Foundation supported Centre for Human Rights Studies, Jindal Global Law School, O.P. Jindal Global University, Sonipat Haryana for organizing one day Seminar on "Contemporary Challenges to Communal Harmony in India" on 9th March 2019 at O P Jindal Global University, Sonipat, Haryana. The programme was focused to celebrate the resilience of the constitutional order which affirms the secular character of the Indian State and also highlighted the ongoing task of achieving the constitutional goal of fraternity. The seminar was organized in three thematic sessions to evaluate contemporary challenges in promotion of communal harmony and national integration. About 100 participants participated in the programme.

OTHER DETAILS ABOUT NFCH

Website

40. The web-site of the Foundation (www.nfch.nic.in) was launched during 2002-2003. The website includes all the requisite information about the Foundation and its current activities, details of assisted children-including financial assistance released to them, books, journals, publications available in the library, application forms for grant of assistance under various projects, information regarding National Communal Harmony Awards, photo gallery, citizen's charter, RTI and information about organized seminars, rallies, etc.

Staff

41. As on 31.03.2019, the Foundation had total staff strength of 16 personnel including one helper appointed on daily wage basis.

Donation

42. Year-wise break up of donations received from 1992-93 to 2018-19 is at Fig. 6. Total donation of Rs.2.57 Crore (approx) was received during 2018-19. The spirit of generous cooperation shown by PSUs / PSEs, corporate houses, individuals, organizations, etc. in giving donations

for the noble cause is thankfully acknowledged. Despite our desire, it is difficult to enlist all our supporters in the Annual Report. Those who have contributed Rs.20,000 or more are listed at Annex-IV.

43. NFCH signed MoU with Gas Authority of India Limited. (GAIL) for Rs. 50.00 Lakh for providing assistance to children/ beneficiaries under Project Assist in Barpeta, Bongaigaon, Cachar, Chirang, Dibrugarh, Dima Hasso (N.C. Hills), Goalpara, Golaghat, Kamrup, Kamrup Metropolitan, Karbi Anglong, Morigaon, Tinsukia, Udalguri, Lahimpur & Sonitpur districts of Assam; Kishtwar districts of Jammu & Kashmir.

ACCOUNTS AND AUDIT

- **44.** Rules of the Foundation provide for maintenance of proper accounts and other relevant records. The Foundation is also required to prepare an annual statement of accounts and get it audited by a chartered accountant or a firm of chartered accountants approved by the Governing Council.
- **45.** M/s Shekhon & Co., New Delhi audited the accounts of the Foundation for the year 2018-19. The Auditor's Report is placed at Annex-VIII. Audited statement of Accounts and Auditor's Report of the year 2018-19 has been approved by AS & FA (Home) on File No. 1/19/2019-NFCH.

Year -wise total number of assisted children from 1992-93 to 2018-19 Figure – 1







State wise cumulative number of total assisted children as on 31/03/2019




Figure – 5 Year-wise despatch of publicity material from 1992-93 to 2018-19





Figure – 6 Year-wise break up of donations received from 1992-93 to 2018-19

Subject: Observance of Flag Day by the National Foundation for Communal Harmony - Participation of Government Servants-CCS (Conduct) Rules 1964.

Under Rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 no Government servant shall, except with the previous sanction of the Government or of the prescribed authority, ask for or accept contribution to or otherwise associate himself with the raising of any funds or other collections in cash or in kind in pursuance of any object whatsoever.

The National Foundation for Communal Harmony has been set up for promoting communal harmony and particularly for the physical and psychological rehabilitation of children rendered orphans and destitutes in communal violence. The Foundation has been engaging in efforts to collect contributions and observes every year a 'Fund Raising Week', and 'Flag Day', clarifications have been sought whether Central Government Servants could be associated with or involved in the above fund raising efforts of the Foundation.

The matter has been examined and keeping in view the objectives of the National Foundation for Communal Harmony, the Government of India have decided to relax the provisions of Rule 12 to allow Central Government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of National Foundation For Communal Harmony (NFCH) New Delhi, a Society registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860, which comprise the Balance Sheet at March 31st 2019, the Statement of Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payment Account for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to explanations given to us, the financial statements give the information required in the manner so required and give true and fair view in accordance with the Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI):

- (a) In case of Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the Society as at March 31, 2019;
- (b) In case Statement of Income and Expenditure Account, of the deficit for the year ended on that date; and

Notification No. 50/2018-Central Tax dated 13.09.2018 provides that a Society established by the Central Government or State Government or local Authority and registered under Societies Registeration Act, 1860 is required to disclusion GST at specified rate on payments made to a supplier of taxable goods conservices, where the total value of such supply, under an individual contract exceeds Rs. 2,50,000/-. The Council is advised to obtain registeration under GST Act and comply with the above provisions relating to deduction of TDS on GST.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

SCHEDULE 14 : SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

I. Accounting Convention

- The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention and in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles and standards.
- The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis unless otherwise indicated.
- Assistance to children, Awards and fellowships, are accounted as and when paid. No provision is made for future installments of assistance to be provided to the children covered under the scheme of project "Assist".

II. <u>Grant/Subsidies</u>

- Government grants/subsidies are accounted for on realization basis.
- Government grants of the nature of contribution towards capital cost of setting up projects are treated as capital reserve.
- Grants in respect of specific fixed assets acquired are shown as a deduction from the cost of related assets.
- At present, the foundation collects and maintains details using dedicated software. One consolidated entry for all the donations is passed at the end of each month or year in the account books.
- Categorization of Grants/Donations among Government Agencies, Institution, Welfare bodies and individuals (Schedule-8) is based on the coding system developed in software used for maintaining donor details. Grants are included in donations.

III. Anonymous Donations

- Anonymous donations represents direct deposit of cash/ instruments in the bank account of foundation. Names and other details are not available with the foundation.
- Donation received during the year include an amount of Rs. 93,79,479/- as anonymous donation.

IV. Activities of the foundation

- The foundation is an autonomous organization under the aegis of Ministry of Home affairs and has been registered under the societies Registration act, 1860 in the year 1992.
- The main activities of the foundation include providing assistance to children affected by communal disharmony and other promotional activities for communal harmony in the country.
- Expenditure on such activities is shown in schedule-11 to the Income & Expenditure Account.

V. Inventory Valuation

 Inventories, which consist of NFCH publications are stated at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost of inventories is determined using first in first out (FIFO) formula. This practice is being followed in the Foundation.

VI. Investments

- There are no Ear marked funds. Corpus and surplus funds are kept invested in medium term government securities or Bank FDRs (Shown as "Other Investment") to generate fixed income (interest) to take care the core activities of the foundation.
- Investments are stated at cost. Interest accrued thereon is shown under "Loans, advances and other assets".

VII. Tangible fixed assets

- Fixed assets are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The cost comprises purchase price and directly attributable cost of bringing the assets to its working condition for intended use. Further, any trade discounts, rebates or input credits are deducted in arriving at the purchase price.
- Subsequent expenditure related to an item of fixed asset is added to its book value only if it increases the future benefits from the existing asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance. All other expenses on existing fixed assets, including day to day repair and maintenance expenditure and cost of replacing parts are charged to the statement of profit and loss for the period during which such expenses are incurred.
- No fixed assets have been received by way of non monetary grants.

VIII. Cash Payments

The foundation releases advances and expenses through bearer cheque.
 These withdrawals are debited to advance or expenses, as the case may be.



No payments are made out of cash in Hand or recorded in cash book at any stage.

IX. Depreciation on tangible assets

- Depreciation on fixed assets is calculated on written down value basis using the rates prescribed in rules under Income Tax Act, 1961.
- Assets costing Rs. 5000 or less each are fully depreciated in the year of Purchase.

X. Foreign currency transactions

- There are no foreign currency transactions during the FY 2018-19.
- There are no foreign currency assets or liabilities.

XI. Retirement benefits

 Liability towards gratuity payable on death/retirement of employees and for accumulated leave encashment benefit to the regular employees is provided for on accrual basis. The provision is being made in accordance with Government of India rules for calculation of Gratuity and leave encashment since FY 2007-08.

XII. Employees

- Expenses on Employees' Retirement and Terminal Benefits (Schedule-12) include provision for Leave Encashment and Gratuity liability.
- The Foundation follows Central Government rules mutatis mutandis in respect of salary fixation of regular employees including contract employed and re employed retired Government servants. The Foundation pays the salary in accordance with Seventh Pay Commission in respect of such employees.

XIII. Capital commitments

There are no Capital commitments.

XIV. Contingent Liability

There are no Contingent Liabilities.

XV. Provision Regarding Audit fees

 Provision for audit fees has been made for Rs. 14,750/-(Inc. Goods and Services Tax).

XVI. Provisions and Contingent Liability

 There are no Contingent Liabilities which needs provision as informed to us by the management.

XVII. Cash and Cash Equivalents

 Cash and Cash Equivalents for the purpose of Cash Flow Statements comprise Cash in Hand and at Bank and Short Term Investments with an original maturity of three month or less.

XVIII. Prior Period Items

 The excess interest accrued on the fixed deposits of the Society over previous years should have been spread over those years and the auditors of the previous years should have pointed this out. Therefore, the excess interest amounting to Rs.2,74,17,956/- incorrectly booked in the previous year's accounts is now being rectified in the accounts of current year."

XIX. Previous Year figures

 Previous Year figures have been regrouped/ reclassified wherever necessary to correspond with the current year's classification/disclosure.
