# Vision

"India free from communal and all other forms of violence where all citizens especially children & youth live together in peace & harmony"

Mission

"Promoting Communal Harmony, Strengthening National Integration and Fostering Unity in Diversity through collaborative social action, awareness programs, reaching out to the victims of violence especially children, encouraging interfaith dialogue for India's Shared Security, Peace & Prosperity"



National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH) is an autonomous organization with Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India. It was registered on 19th February 1992 under Societies Registration Act, 1860. Its office is located on the 9th Floor, 'C' Wing, Lok Nayak Bhawan, Khan Market, New Delhi-110003.

#### **Objectives**

- 2. The objectives of the Foundation are:
  - (i) To undertake programmes or projects for providing assistance to children of families affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence which fracture social harmony, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time, in particular for their care and education;
  - (ii) To undertake programmes or projects for assisting in physical and psychological rehabilitation of children, families or other victims of communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence / clashes which fracture social harmony for their assimilation into the mainstream of society, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time;
  - (iii) To promote or undertake activities which highlight and strengthen bonds of unity and affinity between different religious and other groups in the country;
  - (iv) To undertake and encourage activities which promote belief in principles of non-violence in resolving disputes between different religious and other groups in society;
  - (v) To institute awards for individuals as well as institutions for outstanding contributions to the cause of communal harmony and National Integration;
  - (vi) To cooperate with, and secure cooperation of Central Government, State Governments, Union Territory Administrations, industrial & commercial organizations, non-governmental, voluntary & other organizations and bodies in promoting the objectives of the Foundation;
  - (vii) To provide information services, set up libraries, bring out journals, books or other forms of literature to promote the objectives of the Foundation;
  - (viii) To do all such other lawful acts and things as may be necessary or conducive for furthering the objectives of the Foundation.

#### **ORGANISATION & MANAGEMENT**

3. The Foundation has two main bodies to carry out the objectives set out for the Foundation, namely, the

Governing Council and the Executive Council. While the Governing Council formulates overall policies, the Executive Council is responsible for the management and administration of the Foundation. The Governing Council consists of not more than 25 members to be nominated by Ministry of Home Affairs with Union Home Minister as its Chairman (Annex-V). The Executive Council has eight members, with Union Home Secretary as its Chairman (Annex-VI). The General Body has been constituted for the first time by the Ministry of Home Affairs vide order dated 2nd August 2017 (Annex –VII). The Secretary of the Foundation is the Principal Executive Officer.

#### **Funds**

4. Government of India provided a corpus fund of Rs.10 Crore to the Foundation on its establishment in 1992. The corpus fund was enhanced to Rs.11 Crore in 2004 following merger of Communal Harmony Fund of Rupees One Crore with the corpus of the Foundation. To augment its resources, the Foundation makes appeal to general public, State Governments / Union Territory Administrations, Central Government Departments, Public Sector Undertakings/Enterprises, Educational institutions etc. for voluntary donations to the Foundation for noble cause. All donations to the Foundation are fully exempted from Income Tax under Section 80G(2)[(iii)(e)] of the Income Tax Act, 1961. The Government of India vide Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances & Pension (Department of Personnel & Training) O.M.No. 11013/9/95-Estt-(A) dated 02.11.1995 has relaxed provisions of rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 to allow Central Government servants to participate in fund raising efforts of the Foundation on voluntary basis (Annex-I). Similar relaxation has also been given by few State Governments allowing State Government servants to participate in fund raising efforts of the Foundation on voluntary basis. These include Governments of Goa, Himachal Pradesh, Punjab, Kerala and Sikkim.

#### **ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAMMES**

- 5. The major activity of the Foundation is to implement programmes and projects for effective rehabilitation of child victims of communal, caste, ethnic, terrorist or other form of societal violence/clashes. The emphasis remains on providing assistance to such children for their education and promoting communal harmony and National Integration through various promotional activities.
- 6. Existing programmes of the Foundation may be categorized as:
- Project 'Assist'
- Project 'Recognition'
- Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day

- Project 'Research'
- Library & Publications
- Extension Activities
- Other activities

Brief about these programmes are given hereunder:

#### **Project 'Assist'**

- 7. Project 'Assist' is the Flagship scheme of the Foundation which provides financial assistance to children, who become orphan or destitute due to death of both the parents or surviving parent or death /permanent incapacitation of main earning parent due to communal or any other kind of societal violence. Children whose family income is up to Rupee Two Lakh per annum are eligible for financial assistance under the project. Each identified child is provided financial assistance @ Rs.1,250 per month up to class XII; Rs.1,500 per month for graduation / postgraduation and Rs.1,750 per month for professional courses, without any restriction on the number of children in a family. The assistance is given till the child attains the age of 25 years.
- 8. A total of 13,814 children have been benefited under project 'Assist' from the year 1992-93 to 2020-21 (Annex-II). Year-wise number of assisted children is given at Figure-1. Expenditure of Rs.94.59 Crore has been incurred since the inception of the scheme on assistance to child victims, as on 31.03.2021. A sum of Rs.4.44Crore was incurred on project 'Assist' during the year 2020-21, covering 2653 children (Annex-II). Up-dated year-wise expenditure on this project is at Figure-2. During 2020-21, 335 fresh cases were approved and 2,318 cases were renewed for grant of assistance under Project Assist. Year-wise accretion of children assisted by the Foundation is at Figure-3. State-wise distribution of assisted children is at Figure-4.
- 9. Proposals of eligible children, either fresh or for renewal, are received through district administration. These proposals are examined and processed by the Foundation, thereafter; the assistance for the children is released either directly or through the concerned District Collectors/ Magistrates / Deputy Commissioners etc. for further disbursement to each child. Immediately after release of assistance by the Foundation, the affected families are informed.
- 10. The Foundation also seeks cooperation from concerned State Government, District Administration and other organizations for identifying eligible child victims for consideration of proposals for grant of financial assistance. In Assam, a unit under Assam Police, namely "Aashwas" is helping the Foundation in identifying child victims. Similarly, 'Council for Rehabilitation of Widows,

Orphans, Handicapped & Old Persons' is facilitating Project 'Assist' in J&K. In addition, State level Nodal Agencies have also been identified in the States of Bihar, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh.

Some Central Public Sector Enterprises (CPSEs) are supporting activities of the Foundation under CSR and provide assistance to the children under Project 'Assist'.

#### **Project 'Recognition'**

11. The Foundation has instituted two annual National Communal Harmony Awards - one in 'Individual' category and the other in 'Organization' category, for outstanding contribution to promotion of communal harmony and/or national integration. The Awards consist of a citation and a cash prize of Rs. 5.00 lakh in the 'Individual' category and a citation and a cash prize of Rs. 10.00 lakh in the 'Organization' category. Selection for the Awards is made by a Jury presided over by Hon'ble Vice President of India. So far, 12 organizations and 15 individuals have been conferred with Awards.

#### **Communal Harmony Campaign Week**

- 12. Communal Harmony Campaign Week is observed as an annual feature from 19th to 25th November every year to coincide with Qaumi Ekta Week. On the occasion, an appeal is made to general public, State Governments/Union Territory Administrations, Ministries /Departments, Public Sector Enterprises, paramilitary forces, educational institutions, etc. to effectively promote values of communal harmony and National integration amongst the people. The appeal inter-alia emphasizes to donate funds on voluntary basis to augment the financial resources of the Foundation to enable it to carry out its activities.
- 13. NFCH prints and distributes publicity materials i.e. Brochures, Posters, Wrappers, and Flag Stickers, Letters and Pamphlets etc. to educational institutions, universities, central public sector undertakings, para-military organizations, States/UTs, Ministries/Departments, and embassies & missions abroad, etc. every year. Publicity materials were sent to about 1.19 Lakh units all over the country during the year 2020 as against about 1.21 Lakh units during 2019. Details of dispatch of publicity material to various units from 1992-93 to 2020-2021 are at Figure 5.
- 14. The week was observed throughout the country with great enthusiasm. Seminars, painting competitions, essay competitions aiming at spreading communal harmony and National integration were organized by various institutions across the country following guidelines and protocols as conveyed by the Government of India due to COVID-19

pandemic. The last working day of the week i.e. 25th November 2020 was observed as the Flag Day throughout the country. This was specially utilized to generate financial support for destitute children affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence.

- 15. Due to unprecedented situation arising out of Covid-19 pandemic and restrictions on social interactions, assisted children were not invited to Delhi for celebration of Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day 2020.
- 16. The Foundation is immensely grateful and appreciates the efforts made by all stakeholders, supporters and well wishers for organizing such programmes and raising funds for the destitute children covered under its Project 'Assist' and also for enhancing the activities of the Foundation.

#### **Project 'Research'**

17. Proposals for study / research are considered from universities, research organisations, schools of social work, autonomous organisations, renowned institutions working in the field, individuals, etc. for participatory and action-oriented research and other studies having strong relevance to promotion of communal harmony and strengthening of National integration.

#### **Library and Publications**

- 18. The Foundation has an established library and has approximately 3300 books, journals and reports on the subject of communal harmony and National integration. The literature available in the library is used by the officials of the Foundation and is consulted by professionals/scholars/students from time to time. Setting up of the library has facilitated carrying out research work on various aspects of communal harmony and national integration. Details about books and journals are available in the library and also on the website of the foundation https://nfchlibrary.nic.in.
- 19. The Foundation has brought out a number of publications including e-books, books and monographs. List of publications of the Foundation is at **Annex-III.**

The library of the Foundation is updated on e-Granthalaya 4.0, developed by National Informatics Centre, Ministry of Electronic and Information Technology.

#### **Extension Activities**

20. The Foundation under Extension Activities viz. Reach, Interfaith-Interaction, Partnership and Cause Partnership takes up various activities independently or through State Governments/ UT Administrations, Non-governmental organizations, Educational and other

institutions etc. to promote communal harmony and National Integration. Financial assistance is provided by the Foundation to State Govt., NGOs, educational and other institutions for organizing activities for promoting communal harmony and National integration.

- 21. Under Project 'Reach', there is a provision of providing financial assistance of up to Rupees Five Lakh per annum per State/UT for organizing various activities aiming to promote communal harmony and national integration in the concerned States / UTs. The programme envisages debates, seminars, workshops, paintings, poster / slogan and essay writing competitions, music, cultural programmes, mushairas, etc. either directly by the State Governments / UT administrations or through nongovernmental organizations.
- 22. Project 'Interfaith-interaction' envisages financial assistance up to Rs.50,000 per festival per annum for two festivals in a State/UT for organizing inter-community interaction on festivals like Eid, Deepawali, Christmas, Vaisakhi, Lohri, Onam, Pongal and festivals / fairs such as Phool Walon Ki Sair in Delhi, Deva Sharif fair at Barabanki and Nauchandi fair at Meerut in Uttar Pradesh through non-governmental organizations, colleges, universities, etc.
- 23. Project 'Partnership' has provision of partnering with (a) UN organizations, (b) different Government organizations (like NYKS, NSS etc.) and (c) renowned All India level VOs/ NGOs for furthering the objectives of the Foundation. Maximum provision for this scheme has been kept at Rs.5 lakh out of the total budget for the Extension Activities per year.
- 24. Project 'Cause-Partnership' provides that the Foundation may associate itself with other Government Departments, UN organizations, educational institutions or VOs/NGOs to promote communal harmony and national integration without any provision of financial assistance.
- 25. Webinar on "Together We Win: Harmony Amid COVID-19" was organized on 19th August 2020 by National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH) & All India Women's Conference (AIWC), New Delhi.
- 26. Webinar on "India: Symbol of Harmony during Corona Outbreak" was organized on 31st August 2020 by AIWC South Zone in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH).
- 27. Webinar on "Nation Building through Services for Unity and Peace" was organised on 5th September 2020 by AIWC West Zone A & B in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony.
- 28. The Office of Public Affairs of the Bahá'ís of India organized webinar titled, "The Role of Religion in the Fight

Against the Corona Virus Pandemic" on 25th September 2020.

- 29. Webinar on "Role of Women in Promoting Harmony" was organized on 29th September 2020 by AIWC North Zone in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH).
- 30. Webinar on 'Celebration of National Integration Day' under the aegis of Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag day 2020 of NFCH was organized on 19th November 2020 by Sanju Women's Welfare Association (WIA)AIWC, Chennai.
- 31. Webinar on "Lessons to be learnt from Pandemic Covid 19" was organized on 25th November 2020 by AIWC East Zone-A in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH).
- 32. Webinar on "Responsibility of Citizens towards the Society" was organized on 2nd December 2020 by AIWC Central Zone- A in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH).
- 33. Webinar on "Maintaining Physical and Psychological Health during Covid times and thereafter" was organized on 16th December 2020 by AIWC South Zone- B in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH).
- 34. Webinar on "Significance of Peace and Harmony in Crisis Situations" was organized on 22nd December 2020 by AIWC Eastern Zone-B in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH).
- 35. Webinar on "Responsibilities of Citizens towards Society Post Covid-19" was organized on 8th January 2021 by AIWC West Zone B in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH).
- 36. Webinar on "Significance of Peace & Harmony in Crises Management" was organized on 20th January 2021 by AIWC North East Zone (Manipur & Tripura) in collaboration with National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH).
- 37. Webinar on "Gender and Communal Harmony" was organised by Priyadarshini Mahila Samajam (AIWC, Neyyatinkara Branch) in collaboration with All Saints' College, Trivandrum, Kerala on 15th March 2021.
- 38. The Foundation supported NADD Foundation, New Delhi to organize multi city Indian classical music festival "Music for Harmony-2021". Four such events were organized. The first concert was organized on 22nd February 2021 at Kolkata, West Bengal. The second Concert was organized on 28th February 2021 at Ranchi, Jharkhand. The third Concert was held at Surat, Gujarat on 10th March 2021. The fourth Concert was organized on 26th March 2021 at Bangalore, Karnataka.

45. As on 31.03.2021, the Foundation had total staff strength of 14 personnel.

#### **Donation**

46. Year-wise break up of donations received from 1992-93 to 2020-21 is at Figure- 6. Total donation of Rs. 4.41 Crore (approx) was received during 2020-21. The spirit of generous cooperation shown by PSUs / PSEs, corporate houses, individuals, organizations, etc. in giving donations for the noble cause is thankfully acknowledged. 






Year-wise dispatch of publicity material from 1992-93 to 2020-21

#### OFFICE MEMORANDUM

Subject: Observance of Flag Day by the National Foundation for Communal Harmony - Participation of Government Servants-CCS (Conduct) Rules 1964.

Under Rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 no Government servant shall, except with the previous sanction of the Government or of the prescribed authority, ask for or accept contribution to or otherwise associate himself with the raising of any funds or other collections in cash or in kind in pursuance of any object whatsoever.

The National Foundation for Communal Harmony has been set up for promoting communal harmony and particularly for the physical and psychological rehabilitation of children rendered orphans and destitute in communal violence. The Foundation has been engaging in efforts to collect contributions and observes every year a 'Fund Raising Week', and 'Flag Day', clarifications have been sought whether Central Government Servants could be associated with or involved in the above fund raising efforts of the Foundation.

The matter has been examined and keeping in view the objectives of the National Foundation for Communal Harmony, the Government of India have decided to relax the provisions of Rule 12 to allow Central Government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis.

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## SCHEDULE 14 : SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND NOTES TO ACCOUNTS FOR YEAR ENDED 31<sup>ST</sup> MARCH,2021

#### I. Accounting Convention

- The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention and in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles and standards.
- The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis unless otherwise stated.
- Assistance to children, Awards and fellowships, are accounted as and when paid. No provision is made for future installments of assistance to be provided to the children covered under the scheme of project "Assist".

#### II. Grant/Subsidies

- Government grants/subsidies are accounted for on realization/receipt basis.
- Government grants of the nature of contribution towards capital cost of setting up projects are treated as capital reserve.
- Grants in respect of specific fixed assets acquired are shown as a deduction from the cost of related assets.
- The Foundation collects and maintains details of donation using dedicated software. One consolidated entry for all the donations is passed at the end of each month or year in the books of account.
- Categorization of Grants/Donations among Government Agencies, Institution, Welfare bodies and individuals (Schedule-8) is based on the coding system developed in software used for maintaining donor details. Grants are included in donations.

#### III. Anonymous Donations

- Anonymous donations represents direct deposit of cash/ instruments in the bank account of foundation. Names and other details are not available with the Foundation.
- Donations received during the year include an amount of Rs. 73,03,995/-(previous year Rs. 1,03,19,320/- as anonymous donation.

#### IV. Activities of the Foundation

- The Foundation is an autonomous organization under the aegis of Ministry of Home affairs and has been registered under the societies Registration act, 1860 in the year 1992.
- The main activities of the Foundation include providing assistance to children affected by communal disharmony and other promotional activities for communal harmony in the country.
- Expenditure on such activities is shown in schedule-11 to the Income & Expenditure Account.

#### V. Inventory Valuation

 Inventories, which consist of NFCH publications are stated at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost of inventories is determined using first in first out (FIFO) formula.

#### VI. Investments

- There are no Ear marked funds. Corpus and surplus funds are kept invested in medium term government securities or Bank FDRs (Shown as "Other Investment") to generate fixed income (interest) to take care of the core activities of the foundation.
- Investments are stated at cost. Interest accrued thereon is shown under "Current assets, Loans, advances and other assets".

#### VII. Tangible fixed assets

- Fixed assets are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The cost comprises purchase price and directly attributable cost of bringing the assets to its working condition for intended use. Further, any trade discounts, rebates or input credits are deducted in arriving at the purchase price.
- Subsequent expenditure related to an item of fixed asset is added to its book value only if it increases the future benefits from the existing asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance. All other expenses on existing fixed assets, including day to day repair and maintenance expenditure and cost of replacing parts are charged to the statement of profit and loss for the period during which such expenses are incurred.
- No fixed assets have been received by way of non monetary grants.

#### VIII. Cash Payments

The Foundation releases advances and expenses through bearer cheque.
 These withdrawals are debited to advance or expenses, as the case may be.



No payments are made out of cash in hand or recorded in cash book at any stage.

#### IX. Depreciation on tangible assets

- Depreciation on fixed assets is calculated on written down value basis using the rates prescribed in rules under Income Tax Act, 1961.
- Assets costing Rs. 5000 or less each are fully depreciated in the year of Purchase.

#### X. Foreign currency transactions

- There are no foreign currency transactions during the financial year 2020-21.
- There are no foreign currency assets or liabilities.

#### XI. Retirement benefits

 Liability towards gratuity payable on death/retirement of employees and for accumulated leave encashment benefit to the regular employees is provided for on accrual basis. The provision is being made in accordance with Government of India rules for calculation of Gratuity and leave encashment since FY 2007-08.

#### XII. Employees

- Expenses on Employees' Retirement and Terminal Benefits (Schedule-12) include provision for Leave Encashment and Gratuity liability.
- The Foundation follows Central Government rules mutatis mutandis in respect of salary fixation of regular employees including contract employes and re employed retired Government servants. The Foundation pays the salary in accordance with Seventh Pay Commission in respect of such employees.

#### XIII. Capital commitments

There are no Capital commitments.

#### XIV. Contingent Liability

There are no Contingent Liabilities.

#### XV. Provision Regarding Audit fees

 Provision for audit fees has been made for Rs. 14,750/- (Inc. Goods and Services Tax).

#### XVI. Provisions and Contingent Liability

 There are no Contingent Liabilities which needs provision as informed to us by the management.

#### XVII. Cash and Cash Equivalents


