## INTRODUCTION

National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH) is an autonomous organization with Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India. It was registered on 19<sup>th</sup> February 1992 under Societies Registration Act, 1860. Its office is located on the 9<sup>th</sup> Floor, 'C' Wing, Lok Nayak Bhawan, Khan Market, New Delhi-110003.

#### **Objectives**

- 2. The objectives of the Foundation are:
  - To undertake programmes or projects for providing assistance to children of families affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence which fractures social harmony, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time, in particular for their care and education;
  - (ii) To undertake programmes or projects for assisting in physical and psychological rehabilitation of children, families or other victims of communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence / clashes which fracture social harmony for their assimilation into the mainstream of society, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time;
  - (iii) To promote or undertake activities which highlight and strengthen bonds of unity and affinity between different religious and other groups in the country;
  - (iv) To undertake and encourage activities which promote belief in principles of non-violence in resolving disputes between different religious and other groups in society;
  - (v) To institute awards for individuals as well as institutions for outstanding contributions to the cause of communal harmony and National Integration;
  - (vi) To cooperate with, and secure cooperation of Central Government, State Governments, Union Territory Administrations, industrial & commercial organizations, non-governmental, voluntary & other organizations and bodies in promoting the objectives of the Foundation;
  - (vii) To provide information services, set up libraries, bring out journals, books or other forms of literature to promote the objectives of the Foundation;
  - (viii) To do all such other lawful acts and things as may be necessary or conducive for furthering the objectives of the Foundation.

### ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

3. The Foundation has two main bodies to carry out the objectives set out for the Foundation, namely, the

Governing Council and the Executive Council. While the Governing Council formulates overall policies, the Executive Council is responsible for the management and administration of the Foundation. The Governing Council consists of not more than 25 members to be nominated by Ministry of Home Affairs with Union Home Minister as its Chairman (Annex-V). The Executive Council has eight members, with Union Home Secretary as its Chairman (Annex-VI). The General Body has been constituted for the first time by the Ministry of Home Affairs vide order dated 2<sup>nd</sup> August 2017 (Annex –VII). The Secretary of the Foundation is the Principal Executive Officer.

#### Funds

Government of India provided a corpus fund of Rs.10 4 Crore to the Foundation on its establishment in 1992. The corpus fund was enhanced to Rs.11 Crore in 2004 following merger of Communal Harmony Fund of Rupees One Crore with the corpus of the Foundation. To augment its resources, the Foundation makes appeal to general public, State Governments / Union Territory Administrations, Central Government Departments, Public Sector Undertakings/Enterprises, Educational institutions etc. for voluntary donations to the Foundation for noble cause. All donations to the Foundation are fully exempted from Income Tax under Section 80G(2)[(iii)(e)] of the Income Tax Act. 1961. The Government of India vide Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances & Pension (Department of Personnel & Training) O.M. No. 11013/9/95-Estt-(A) dated 02.11.1995 has relaxed provisions of rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 to allow Central Government servants to participate in fund raising efforts of the Foundation on voluntary basis (Annex-I). Similar relaxation has also been given by few State Governments allowing State Government Servants to participate in fund raising efforts of the Foundation on voluntary basis. These include Governments of Goa, Himachal Pradesh, Punjab, Kerala and Sikkim.

#### ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAMMES

5. The major activity of the Foundation is to implement programmes and projects for effective rehabilitation of child victims of communal, caste, ethnic, terrorist or other form of societal violence/clashes. The emphasis remains on providing assistance to such children for their education and promoting communal harmony and National Integration through various promotional activities.

6. Programmes of the Foundation may be categorized as:

- Project 'Assist'
- Project 'Recognition'
- > Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day

- Project 'Research'
- Library & Publications
- Extension Activities
- Other activities

Brief about of these programmes are given hereunder:

#### Project 'Assist'

7. Project 'Assist' is the Flagship scheme of the Foundation which provides financial assistance to children, who become orphan or destitute due to death of both the parents or surviving parent or death /permanent incapacitation of main earning parent due to communal or any other kind of societal violence. Children whose family income is up to Rupee Two Lakh per annum are eligible for financial assistance under the project. Each identified child is provided financial assistance @ Rs.1,250 per month up to class XII; Rs.1,500 per month for graduation / post-graduation and Rs.1,750 per month for professional courses, without any restriction on the number of children in a family. The assistance is given till the child attains the age of 25 years.

8. A total of **13,998** children have been benefited under project 'Assist' from the year 1992-93 to 2021-22 (*Annex-II*). Year-wise number of assisted children is given at **Figure-1**. Expenditure of **Rs.100.08** Crore has been incurred since the inception of the scheme on assistance to child victims, as on 31.03.2022. An expenditure of **Rs.5.49** Crore was incurred on Project 'Assist' during the year 2021-22, covering **3,117** children (*Annex-II*). Updated year-wise expenditure on this project is at **Figure-2**. During 2021-22, **184** fresh cases were approved and **2,933** cases were renewed for grant of assistance under Project Assist. Year-wise accretion of children assisted by the Foundation is at *Figure-3*. State-wise distribution of assisted children is at *Figure-4*.

9. Proposals of eligible children, either fresh or for renewal, are received through district administration. These proposals are examined and processed by the Foundation, thereafter; the assistance for the children is released either directly or through the concerned District Collectors/ Magistrates / Deputy Commissioners etc. for further disbursement to each child. Immediately after release of assistance by the Foundation, the affected families are informed.

10. The Foundation also seeks cooperation from concerned State Government, District Administration and other organizations for identifying eligible child victims for consideration of proposals for grant of financial assistance. In Assam, a unit under Assam Police, namely *Aashwas* is helping the Foundation in identifying child victims. Similarly, 'Council for Rehabilitation of Widows, Orphans, Handicapped & Old Persons' is facilitating Project 'Assist' in J&K. In addition, State level Nodal Agencies have been identified in the States of Bihar,

Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh.

Some Central Public Sector Enterprises (CPSEs) are supporting activities of the Foundation under Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) and provide assistance to children under Project 'Assist'.

#### **Project 'Recognition'**

11. The Foundation has instituted two annual National Communal Harmony Awards - one in 'Individual' category and the other in 'Organization' category, for outstanding contribution to promotion of communal harmony and/or national integration. The Awards consist of a citation and cash prize of Rs. 5.00 lakh in the 'Individual' category and a citation and cash prize of Rs. 10.00 lakh in the 'Organization' category. Selection for the Awards is made by a Jury presided over by Hon'ble Vice President of India. So far, 12 organizations and 15 individuals have been conferred with these Awards.

#### **Communal Harmony Campaign Week**

12. Communal Harmony Campaign Week is observed as an annual feature from 19<sup>th</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> November every year to coincide with *Qaumi Ekta Week*. On the occasion, an appeal is made to general public, State Governments/ Union Territory Administrations, Ministries /Departments, Public Sector Enterprises, para-military forces, educational institutions, etc. to effectively promote values of communal harmony and National integration amongst the people. The appeal *inter-alia* emphasizes to donate funds on voluntary basis to augment the financial resources of the Foundation to enable it to carry out its activities.

13. NFCH prints and distributes publicity materials i.e. Brochures, Posters, Wrappers, and Flag Stickers, Letters and Pamphlets etc. to educational institutions, universities, central public sector undertakings, paramilitary organizations, States/UTs, Ministries/ Departments, and embassies & missions abroad, etc. every year. Publicity materials were sent to about 1.19 Lakh units during the year 2021. Details of dispatch of publicity material to various units from 1992-93 to 2021-22 are given at *Figure 5*.

14. Communal Harmony Campaign Week 2021 was observed throughout the country with great enthusiasm. Seminars, painting competitions, essay competitions aiming at spreading communal harmony and National integration were organized by institutions across the country following guidelines and protocols as conveyed by the Government of India due to COVID-19 pandemic. The last working day of the week i.e. 25<sup>th</sup> November 2021 was observed as the Flag Day. This was specially utilized to generate financial support for destitute children affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence.

15. Due to unprecedented situation arising out of Covid-19 pandemic and restrictions on social interactions, assisted children were not invited to Delhi during Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day 2021.

16. The Foundation is immensely grateful and appreciates the efforts made by all stakeholders, supporters and well wishers for organizing programmes and raising funds for destitute children covered under Project 'Assist' and for promoting activities of the Foundation.

17. Donations are collected for and on behalf of the Foundation during Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag day by partners across the country. These donations are sent to the Foundation through various instruments which are properly documented, recorded and acknowledged. Donations to the Foundation can also be sent directly or deposited through online transaction available on the website of the Foundation.

18. During Communal Harmony Campaign Week celebration 2021, donations through QR Code facility on the publicity material was also introduced.

#### **Project 'Research'**

19. Proposals for study / research are considered from universities, research organisations, schools of social work, autonomous organisations, renowned institutions working in the field, individuals, etc. for participatory and action-oriented research and other studies having strong relevance to promotion of communal harmony and strengthening of National integration.

#### **Library and Publications**

20. The Foundation has an established library and has about **3300** books, journals and reports on the subject of communal harmony and National integration. The literature available in the library is used by the officials of the Foundation and by professionals/ scholars/students. Setting up of a library has facilitated research work on various aspects of communal harmony and national integration. Details about books and journals are available in the library and also on the website of the foundation https://nfchlibrary.nic.in.

21. The Foundation has brought out number of publications including e-books, books and monographs. List of publications of the Foundation is at *Annex-III.* 

The library of the Foundation is updated on e-Granthalaya 4.0, which is developed by National Informatics Centre, Ministry of Electronic and Information Technology.

#### **Extension Activities**

22. The Foundation under Extension Activities viz. Reach, Interfaith-Interaction, Partnership and Cause Partnership takes up various activities independently or through State Governments / Administrations, Nongovernmental organizations, Educational and other institutions etc. to promote communal harmony and National Integration. Financial assistance is provided by the Foundation to State Govt., NGOs, educational and other institutions for organizing activities for promoting communal harmony and National integration.

23. Under Project 'Reach', there is a provision of providing financial assistance of up to Rupees Five Lakh per annum per State/UT for organizing various activities aiming to promote communal harmony and national integration in the concerned States / UTs. The programmes include debates, seminars, workshops, paintings, poster / slogan and essay writing competitions, music, cultural programmes, *mushairas*, etc. either directly by the State Governments / UT administrations or through non-governmental organizations.

24. Project 'Interfaith-interaction' envisages financial assistance up to Rs.50,000 per festival per annum for two festivals in a State/UT for organizing inter-community interaction on festivals like Eid, Deepawali, Christmas, Vaisakhi, Lohri, Onam, Pongal and festivals / fairs such as Phool Walon Ki Sair in Delhi, Deva Sharif fair at Barabanki and Nauchandi fair at Meerut in Uttar Pradesh through non-governmental organizations, colleges, universities, etc.

25. Project 'Partnership' has provision of partnering with (a) UN organizations, (b) different Government organizations (like NYKS, NSS etc.) and (c) renowned All India level VOs/NGOs for furthering the objectives of the Foundation. Maximum annual provision for this scheme has been kept at Rs.5 lakh out of the total budget for Extension Activities per year.

26. Project 'Cause-Partnership' provides that the Foundation may associate itself with other Government Departments, UN organizations, educational institutions or VOs/NGOs to promote communal harmony and national integration without any financial assistance.

#### **Donations**

61. Year-wise break up of donations received from 1992-93 to 2021-22 is given at **Figure-6**. Total donation of about **Rs. 7.25 Crore** was received during 2021-22. The spirit of generous cooperation shown by PSUs / PSEs, corporate houses, individuals, organizations, etc. in giving donations for the noble cause is thankfully acknowledged. 


Year-wise cumulative total number of assisted children from 1992-93 to 2021-22









Year-wise dispatch of publicity material from 1992-93 to 2021-22

#### **OFFICE MEMORANDUM**

# Subject: Observance of Flag Day by the National Foundation for Communal Harmony - Participation of Government Servants-CCS (Conduct) Rules 1964.

Under Rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 no Government servant shall, except with the previous sanction of the Government or of the prescribed authority, ask for or accept contribution to or otherwise associate himself with the raising of any funds or other collections in cash or in kind in pursuance of any object whatsoever.

The National Foundation for Communal Harmony has been set up for promoting communal harmony and particularly for the physical and psychological rehabilitation of children rendered orphans and destitute in communal violence. The Foundation has been engaging in efforts to collect contributions and observes every year a 'Fund Raising Week', and 'Flag Day', clarifications have been sought whether Central Government Servants could be associated with or involved in the above fund raising efforts of the Foundation.

The matter has been examined and keeping in view the objectives of the National Foundation for Communal Harmony, the Government of India have decided to relax the provisions of Rule 12 to allow Central Government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis.

# NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### GENERAL INFORMATION

National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH) is an autonomous organization with Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India. It was registered on 19<sup>th</sup> February, 1992 under Societies Registration Act, 1860. Its office is located on the 9th Floor, 'C' Wing, Lok Nayak Bhawan, Khan Market, New Delhi – 110 003.

### **OBJECTIVES OF NCFH**

The objectives of the foundation are -

(i) To undertake programmes or projects for providing assistance to children of families affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence which fracture social harmony, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time, in particular for their care and education

(ii) To undertake programmes or projects for assisting in physical and psychological rehabilitation of children, families or other victims of communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence *I* clashes which fracture social harmony for their assimilation into the mainstream of society, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time

(iii) To promote or undertake activities which highlight and strengthen bonds of unity and affinity between different religious and other groups in the country

(iv) To undertake and encourage activities which promote bellef in principles of non-violence in resolving disputes between different religious and other groups in society

(v) To institute awards for individuals as well as institutions for outstanding contributions to the cause of communal harmony and National Integration

(vi) To cooperate with, and secure cooperation of Central Government, State Governments, Union Territory Administrations, industrial & commercial organizations, non-governmental, voluntary & other organizations and bodies in promoting the objectives of the Foundation

(vii) To provide information services, set up libraries, bring out journals, books or other forms of literature to promote the objectives of the Foundation

(viii) To do all such other lawful acts and things as may be necessary or conducive for furthering the objectives of the Foundation.

# NOTE NO. 14 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# 14.1 ACCOUNTING CONVENTION

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention, unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting.

Further, the financial statements comply in all material aspects with the Accounting Standards as prescribed by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India and Generally Accepted Accounting Principles.

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently from the previous year to the current year presented in these financial statements

Assistance to children, awards and fellowships, are accounted as and when paid. No provision is made for future instalments of assistance to be provided to the children covered under the scheme of "Project Assist".

### 14.2 FUNCTIONAL AND PRESENTATION CURRENCY

These financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (INR), which is the foundation's functional and presentation currency. All amounts have been denominated in INR and rounded off to the nearest rupee, except where otherwise indicated.

### 14.3 USE OF JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements requires estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Although, such estimates and assumptions are made on a reasonable and prudent basis taking into account all available information, actual results could differ from these estimates. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision effects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future years.

The accounting treatment and presentation in the Balance Sheet and the Income and Expenditure Account, of transactions and events are governed by their substance and not merely by the legal form.



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# 14.4 CORPUS / CAPITAL FUND

Corpus / Capital Fund is akin to Capital, Share Capital or Owners' Funds. It comprises amounts received by way of contributions specifically to the Corpus, as increased / decreased by the net operating results shown in the Income and Expenditure Account (other than surplus, if any, transferred to any Reserves or Earmarked Funds).

# 14.5 RESERVES AND SURPLUS

Reserves and Surplus Fund includes General Reserve and comprises of amounts as increased / decreased by the net operating results shown in the Income and Expenditure Account.

### 14.6 LONG TERM PROVISIONS


Long Term Provisions include Liability towards gratuity payable on death / retirement of employees and for accumulated leave encashment benefit to the regular employees and are provided for on accrual basis. The provision is being made in accordance with Government of India rules for calculation of Gratuity and leave encashment since FY 2007 – 08.

Expenses on Employees' Retirement and Terminal Benefits (Schedule -11) include provision for Leave Encashment and Gratuity liability.

The Foundation follows Central Government rules mutatis mutandis in respect of salary fixation of regular employees including contract employees and reemployed refired Government servants. The Foundation pays the salary in accordance with Seventh Pay Commission in respect of such employees.

# 14.7 CURRENT LIABILITIES

Current Liabilities include llabilities on account of Statutory Dues, Expenses and Audit Fees payable by the foundation. Statutory Dues are further classified as Overdue Dues and Dues pending for less than 6 months.

# 14.8 PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

a) Property, Plant and Equipment is initially measured at cost of acquisition/construction including any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Property, plant and equipment held for use or for administrative purposes, are stated in the balance sheet at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. The cost includes non-refundable taxes, duties, freight and other incidental expenses related to the acquisition and installation of the respective assets.

Property, Plant and Equipment acquired as replacement of the existing assets are capitalized and its corresponding replaced assets removed / retired from active use are derecognized. If the cost of the replaced part or earlier inspection is not available, the estimated cost of similar new parts / inspection is used as an indication of what the cost of the existing part/ inspection component was when the item was acquired or inspection was carried out.

After initial recognition, Property, Plant and Equipment is carried at cost less accomulated depreciation / amortisation and accumulated impairment losses, if any.

b) None of the Fixed Assets have been received by way of non-monetary grants.

# 14.9 DEPRECIATION

a) Depreciation is provided on written down value method as per rates specified in the income Tax Act, 1961 except depreciation on cost adjustments arising on account of conversion of foreign currency liability for acquisition of fixed assets, which is amortized over the residual life of the respective assets.

b) In respect of additions to / deductions from fixed assets during the year, depreciation is considered on pro-rata basis as per provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

c) Assets costing Rs. 5,000 or less each are fully provided.

# 14.10 INVESTMENTS

There are no Earmarked funds. Corpus and surplus funds are kept invested in medium term government securities or Bank FDRs (Shown as "Other Investment") to generate fixed income (interest) to take care of the core activities of the foundation.

Investments are stated at cost. Interest accrued thereon is shown under "Current Assets, Loans, Advances and other assets".

# 14.11 INVENTORIES

Inventories consist of NFCH publications and are stated at lower of cost or net realizable, value. Cost of inventories is determined using First In First Out (FIFO) formula.

### 14.12 CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and Cash Equivalents comprise of Cash in Hand and at Bank and Short Term Investments with an original maturity of three month or less.

Cash Payments -

The Foundation releases advances and expenses through bearer cheque. These withdrawals are debited to advance or expenses, as the case may be. No payments are made out of cash in hand or recorded in cash book at any stage.

# 14.13 FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS

a) Transactions denominated in foreign currency are accounted at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of the transaction.

b) Current assets, foreign currency loans and current liabilities are converted at the exchange rate prevailing at the year end and the resultant gain / loss is adjusted to cost of fixed assets, if the foreign currency liability relates to fixed assets, and in other cases is considered to revenue.

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# 14.14 PROVISIONS AND CONTINGENCIES RELATED TO CLAIMS, LITIGATION etc.

### 14.14.1 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the foundation has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Provisions are determined based on management estimates required to settle the obligation at the Balance Sheet date. Provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and are adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

# 14.14.2 Contingencies

Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the institute or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made. Information on contingent liability(ies) is disclosed in the Notes to the Financial Statements.

# 14.14.3 Arbitration Awards

Arbitration / Court's awards along with related interest receivable / payable are, to the extent not taken into accounts at the time of initiation, are recognized after it becomes decree. Permanent Machinery of Arbitration, Government of India, is accounted for on finalization of award by the appellate authority. Interest to / from in these cases are accounted when the payment is probable which the point is when matter is considered settled by management.

### 14.14.4 Liquidated Damages

Liquidated Damages / Compensation for delay in respect of clients / contractors, if any, are accounted for when payment is probable which is the point when matter is considered settled by management.

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# 14.15 CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

# 14.15.1 Contingent Liabilities

A contingent liability exists when there is a possible but not probable obligation, or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources, or a present obligation whose amount cannot be estimated reliably. Contingent liabilities do not warrant provisions, but are disclosed unless the possibility of outflow of resources is remote.

# 14.15.2 Contingent Assets

Contingent assets are disclosed in the financial statements where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

# 14.16 GOVERNMENT GRANT / SUBSIDIES

- a) Government grants / subsidies are accounted for on realization / receipt basis.
- b) Government grants of the nature of contribution towards capital cost of setting up projects are treated as capital reserve.
- c) Grants in respect of specific fixed assets acquired are shown as a deduction from the cost of related assets.
- d) The Foundation collects and maintains details of donation using dedicated software. One consolidated entry for all the donations is passed at the end of each month or year in the books of account.
- e) Categorization of Grants / Donations among Government Agencies, Institution, Welfare bodies and individuals (Schedule – 8) is based on the coding system developed in software used for maintaining donor details. Grants are included in donations.

# 14.17 ANONYMOUS DONATIONS

Anonymous donations represents direct deposit of cash / instruments in the bank account of foundation. Names and other details are not available with the Foundation.

Donations received during the year include an amount of INR 96,97,022 (previous year INR 73,03,995) as anonymous donation.
