INTRODUCTION

The National Foundation for Communal Harmony (NFCH) is an autonomous organization with the Ministry of Home Affairs. It was registered on 19th February 1992 under the Societies Registration Act, 1860. Its office is located on the 9th Floor, 'C' Wing, Lok Nayak Bhawan, Khan Market, New Delhi-110003.

Objectives

- 2. The objectives of the Foundation are to:
 - (i) undertake programmes or projects for providing assistance to the children of families affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence which fractures social harmony, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time, in particular for their care and education;
 - (ii) undertake programmes or projects for assisting in the physical and psychological rehabilitation of the children, families or other victims of communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence / clashes which fracture social harmony for their assimilation into the mainstream of society, as may be decided by the Governing Council from time to time;
 - (iii) promote or undertake activities which will highlight and strengthen the bonds of unity and affinity between different religious and other groups in the country;
 - (iv) undertake and encourage activities which will promote belief in the principles of non-violence in resolving disputes between different religious and other groups in society;
 - (v) institute awards to individual as well as institutions for their outstanding contributions to the cause of communal harmony and national integration;
 - (vi) cooperate with, and secure the cooperation of the Central Government, State Governments, Union Territory Administrations, industrial & commercial organizations, non-governmental, voluntary & other organisations and bodies in promoting the objectives of the Foundation;
 - (vii) provide information services, set up libraries, bring out journals, books or other forms of literature to promote the objectives of the Foundation;
 - (viii) do all such other lawful acts and things as may be necessary or conducive for furthering the objectives of the Foundation.

II - ORGANISATION AND MANAGEMENT

3. The Foundation has two main bodies to carry out the objectives set out for the Foundation, namely, the Governing Council and the Executive Council. While the Governing Council formulates overall policies, the Executive Council is responsible for the management and administration of the Foundation. The Governing Council consists of not more than 25 members to be nominated by the Ministry of Home Affairs The Union Home Minister is as its Chairman (Annex-V). The Executive Council has eight members, with the Union Home Secretary as its Chairman (Annex-VI). The General Body has been constituted for the first time by the Ministry of Home Affairs vide order dated 2nd august 2017 (Annex –VII) The Secretary of the Foundation is the Principal Executive Officer.

Funds

The Government of India provided a corpus fund of Rs.10 crore to the Foundation on its establishment in 1992. The corpus fund was enhanced to Rs.11 crore in 2004 following merger of Communal Harmony Fund of rupees one crore with the corpus fund of the Foundation. To augment its resources, the Foundation makes appeal to the general public, various State Governments / Union Territory Administrations, Central Government Departments, Public Sector Undertakings / Enterprises, educational institutions etc for voluntary donation to the Foundation for its noble cause. All donations to the Foundation are fully exempted from Income tax under section 80G(iii)(e) of the Income Tax Act, 1961. The Government of India vide Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances & Pension (Department of Personnel & Training) O.M.No.11013/9/95-Estt (A) dated 02.11.1995 relaxed the provisions of rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 to allow Central Government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis (Annex-I). Similar relaxation has also been given by few State Governments allowing State Government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis. These include governments of Goa, Himachal Pradesh, Punjab, Kerala and Sikkim.

III - ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAMMES

- 5. The major activity of the Foundation is to implement programmes and projects for assisting in the effective rehabilitation of child victims of communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence which fractured social harmony. The emphasis remains on providing assistance to such children for their education and promoting communal harmony and national integration through various kinds of promotional activities.
- 6. The existing programmes of the Foundation may be categorized as:
 - > Project 'Assist'
 - > Project 'Recognition'
 - Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day
 - > Project 'Research'
 - ➤ Library & Publications
 - > Extension activities and
 - > Other activities

Brief about these programmes is explained hereunder:

Project 'Assist'

- 7. Under the project 'Assist', financial assistance is provided to children, who become orphan or destitute due to death or permanent incapacitation of either both the parents or the main bread earner in the family in communal and other forms of societal violence. The children whose families income remains up to Rupees Two Lakh per annum are eligible for the financial assistance under the project. Each identified child is provided financial assistance @ Rs.1,000 per month up to class XII; Rs.1,250 per month for the students doing graduation/post-graduation and Rs.1,500 per month to the students of professional courses (like medical, engineering and management), without any restriction on the number of children in a family. The assistance is given till the child attains the age of 25 years.
- 8. A total of 12,385 children have been benefited under the project 'Assist' from the year 1992-93 to 2017-18 (Annex-II). Year-wise number of assisted children is at Figure-1. Expenditure of Rs.78.89 Crores has been incurred since the inception of the scheme on assistance to child victims, as on 31.03.2018. A sum of Rs.6.50 Crores (approximately) was incurred on project 'Assist' during the year 2017-18, covering 4,315 children (Annex-II). Up-dated year-wise expenditure on this project is at Figure-2. From different States, 262 new eligible children were identified and provided assistance in 2017-18. Year-wise accretion of children assisted by

the Foundation is at Figure-3. State-wise distribution of assisted children is at Figure-4.

- 9. Proposals of eligible children, either fresh or renewal, are received through the concerned district administrations. These proposals are examined and processed by the Foundation, thereafter; the assistance for the children is released through the concerned District Collectors / Magistrates / Deputy Commissioners etc. for further disbursement to each child by the concerned district administration. Immediately after release of assistance by the Foundation, the affected families are informed to get timely payment through the office of the respective District Collector / Magistrate or Deputy Commissioner.
- 10. The Foundation also seeks cooperation from concerned State Governments, District Administrations and few other organizations for identifying eligible child victims for consideration of their proposals for grant of financial assistance. In Assam, a unit functioning under the Assam Police, namely *Aashwas* is helping the Foundation in identifying child victims of violence. Similarly, in J&K, the 'Council for Rehabilitation of Widows, Orphans, Handicapped & Old Persons' is also facilitating the project Assist in the State. In addition, State level Nodal Agencies have also been identified in the States of Bihar, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh.

Project 'Recognition'

11. Two National Communal Harmony Awards have been instituted to be conferred annually, one for an individual and another for an organization for outstanding contribution in promoting communal harmony and / or national integration. The awards carry a certificate & cash amount of Rupees Five Lakh for an individual, and a certificate & cash amount of Rupees Ten Lakh for an organization. Selection for the awards is made by a Jury presided over by the Vice President of India.

Communal Harmony Campaign Week

12. The Communal Harmony Campaign Week was observed as an annual feature from the 19th to 25th November 2017 to coincide with the *Qaumi Ekta* week. On the occasion, an appeal was made to the general public, State Governments / Union Territory Administrations, Ministries / Departments, Public Sector Enterprises, Embassies / Missions abroad, para-military forces, educational institutions, etc. to effectively promote the values of communal harmony and national integration amongst the people. The appeal *inter-alia* emphasized to donate funds on voluntary basis to augment the financial resources of the Foundation to enable it to carry on its activities.

- 13. The Foundation got publicity material printed and distributed to State Governments / UT Administrations, Ministries / Departments, Central Public Sector Enterprises, para-military organisations, educational institutions. In all, publicity materials were sent to about 1.25 Lakh units all over the country during the year 2017 as against about 1.24 Lakh units during 2016. Details of dispatch of publicity material to various units during 1992-93 to 2017-18 are at Figure 5.
- This week was observed throughout the country with great energy and passion. As per the appeal made by NFCH, the Foundation received reports that different activities and programmes were organized by educational institutions, etc. during the Week to promote the ethos of communal harmony and national integration. The educational institutions throughout the country organized debate competitions, painting competitions, essay competitions, rallies, etc. during this week. A large number of selected paintings, essays, etc. were sent to the Foundation by the schools/educational institutions. Some of these paintings have been displayed in the Annual Calendar 2018 of the Foundation to encourage the creative efforts of the children. The Week's last working day i.e. 24th November, 2017 (Friday) was observed as the Flag Day throughout the country. This was specially utilized to generate financial support for destitute children affected by communal, caste, ethnic or terrorist violence.
- 15. Six children, two each from the States of Gujarat and Jammu & Kashmir and one each from Assam and Uttar Pradesh were invited by the Foundation along with their mothers/guardians and escorts (State Government representatives) to participate in the Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day celebrations. These children viz. Amrooz Shabir and Sawan Kumar from Jammu & Kashmir; Gopalbhai Vakhatsinh Parmar and Km. Azim Bibi Chiniwala from Gujarat; Km. Martina Saikia (Assam) and Shakeel Ahmed (Uttar Pradesh) were privileged to meet, greet and stick communal harmony flags on the persons of Shri Ram Nath Kovind, Hon'ble President of India; Shri M Venkaiah Naidu, Hon'ble Vice-President of India; Shri Rajnath Singh, Hon'ble Union Home Minister and Shri Rajiv Gauba, Union Home Secretary on Flag Day 24th November 2017.

- 16. These children were taken to local sight-seeing in Delhi and nearby places of historical, religious and cultural importance i.e. Rashtrapati Bhawan, Parliament House, India Gate, Qutub Minar, Raj Ghat, Lal Quila, Nizamuddin Dargah and Rail Museum. They were very excited to see these places and immensely enjoyed their Delhi visit. It was lifetime experience for these children. The children were enthused to intermingle with their fellow friends coming from different states for this celebration.
- 17. The Foundation is immensely grateful and appreciates the efforts made by all stakeholders, supporters and well wishers for organizing such programmes and raising funds for the destitute children covered under its Project 'Assist' and also for enhancing the activities of the Foundation.

Project 'Research'

18. Proposals for study / research are considered from universities, research organisations, schools of social work, autonomous organisations, renowned institutions working in the field, individuals, etc. for participatory and action-oriented research and other studies having strong relevance to promotion of communal harmony and strengthening of national integration.

Library and Publications

19. The Foundation has established а library has approximately 3560 and got books, journals and reports on the subject of integration. communal harmony and national The literature available in the library is being used by the officials of the Foundation and consulted by professionals/ scholars/students from time to time. Setting up of the library has facilitated carrying out research work on various aspects of communal harmony and national integration. Details of information about books and journals available in the library of the Foundation are available online on the website https://nfchlibrary.nic.in.

20. The Foundation has brought out a number of publications including e-books, books and monographs. List of publications of the Foundation is at Annex-III.

The library of the Foundation is updated on e-Granthalaya 4.0 which is developed by National Informatics Centre, Ministry of Electronic and Information Technology.

Extension Activities

- 21. The Foundation under its Extension Activities Reach. Interfaith-Interaction. Partnership and viz. Cause Partnership takes up, various activities, either independently or through State Governments / Administrations, non-governmental organizations, educational and other institutions etc. with a view to promote communal harmony and national integration. Financial assistance is provided by the Foundation to State Govts. / NGOs, educational and other institutions for organizing activities for promoting communal harmony and national integration.
- 22. Under the scheme 'Reach', there is a provision of providing financial assistance up to Rupees Five Lakh per annum per State/UT for organizing various activities aiming to promote communal harmony and national integration in the concerned States / UTs. The programme envisages organisation of debates, seminars, workshops, paintings, poster / slogan and essay writing competitions, music, cultural programmes, mushairas, etc. either directly by the State Governments/ UT administrations or through non-governmental organisations.
- 23. Scheme Interfaith-interaction envisages financial assistance up to Rs.50,000 per festival per annum for two festivals in a State/UT for organizing inter-community interaction on festivals like Id, Deepawali, Christmas, Vaisakhi, Lohri, Onam, Pongal and festivals / fairs such as Phool Walon Ki Sair in Delhi, Deva Sharif fair at Barabanki and Nauchandi fair at Meerut in Uttar Pradesh through non-governmental organizations, colleges, universities, etc.
- 24. Scheme Partnership has provision of partnering with (a) UN organizations, (b) different Government organizations (like NYKS, NSS etc.) and (c) renowned All India level VOs/NGOs for furthering the objectives of the Foundation. Maximum annual provision for this scheme has been kept as Rs.5 lakh out of the total budget for the Extension Activities per year.
- 25. Scheme Cause-Partnership provides that the Foundation may associate itself with other Government Departments, UN organizations, educational institutions or VOs/NGOs to promote communal harmony and

national integration without provision of any financial assistance.

26. NFCH supported Nadd Foundation to organize a multi-city concert series, 'Concert for Harmony'

Nadd Foundation with the collaboration of National Foundation for Communal Harmony organized the 2nd edition of a multi-city concert series, 'Concert for Harmony' in Kincha Auditorium, Bhartiya Vidya Bhavan, Bangalore on May 21st, 2017. This programme was spellbound performance of the blind kids from Gadag followed by violin recital by Mysore Brothers and Flute recital by Pt. Ronu Mazumdar of Mumbai. During the series of 'Concert for Harmony', eminent flutist Pt Rajendra Prasanna followed by sarod recital by Pt Biswajit Roy Chowdhury performed in Gaiety Theatre, Mall Road, Shimla on September 8-9th, 2017.

In another series of 'Concert for Harmony', Padmabhushan Pt Vishwamohan Bhat and eminent vocalist Pt Amarandra Dhaneshwar performed at Swatantraveer Savarkar Smarak Auditorium, Dadar, Mumbai on October, 22nd, 2017. The last programme in this series was organized at Sai International Centre, Lodhi Road, New Delhi on 22.12.2017.

27. NFCH officers visited Bihar & Jharkhand for assessment of Project Assist from 9th to 12th June, 2017

DDO, NFCH visited Jamui district of Bihar, Giridih and Bokaro District of Jharkhand from 9th June 2017 to 12th June 2017 for discussions with District Administration about the coverage of new children under the Foundation's project 'Assist' and also visited Saran (Chapra) district of Bihar for expediting pending cases of 22 children for renewal of assistance.

28. NFCH officers visited Assam for assessment of Project Assist from 7th to 11th October, 2017 DDO, NFCH visited districts Tinsukia, Dibrugarh and Kokrajhar of Assam from 7th October 2017 to 11th October 2017 and interacted with beneficiary children under project 'Assist' of the Foundation, their guardians and the concerned district authorities. The representative

of PowerGrid Corporation of India Limited who provided financial support in the concerned districts was also present in the interaction meeting.

29. The Bharat Sewak Samaj, Manipur State Branch, Imphal organized two days programme on "WE ARE ALL ONE" from 21st to 22nd November 2017 at Manipur

The Bharat Sewak Samaj, Manipur State Branch, Imphal has organized two days programme on "WE ARE ALL ONE" on the theme of cultural integration and unity from 21st to 22nd November 2017 at Thanga Oinam Leikai Community Hall, Thanga, Bishnupur, Manipur. It was a consultative workshop on national integration held at Bishnupur District of Manipur in connection with the Communal Harmony Campaign Week from 19th to 25th November 2017. The programme aimed to bring about national integration, peace, unity and development among the people of India with special emphasis on

assisting destitute children who have become orphans because of communal riots and terrorist activities. The programme was very successful in motivating young people to make them understand communal harmony in a wider context, which enriches human life by promoting unity in diversity and inspiring people to reach the common goal of national integration. Several resource persons, and academics etc. discussed the effective exposition of fundamentals to motivate the youth to understand the true values of peace and harmony and its meaning in life. More than 200 participants attended this programme. Financial assistance of Rs.60,000/-has been provided by NFCH.

30. NFCH organized Inter School competitions in collaboration with ASN Sr. Sec. School Delhi on 22nd November 2017

Foundation organized an Inter School competition on Hindi Declamation on the topic: ''सांप्रदायिक सदभाव राष्ट की आवश्यकता'' in collaboration with ASN Senior Secondary School, Mayur Vihar-I, Delhi to observe Communal Harmony Campaign Week & Flag Day 2017 amongst children of different schools at ASN School premises on 22nd November 2017. Students from 18 different schools participated in the programme. This event provided a platform for interaction between students of various communities. Winners were felicitated with Awards and Certificates by the Foundation.

About 500 school children from different communities assembled on the occasion. During the function, the students presented various programmes including speeches patriotic songs.

31. Good Evening India programme organized by Doordardshan on 30th November 2017 In continuation of celebration of Communal Harmony Campaign Week in the country, the Doordarshan, Delhi invited Shri Awadh Kumar Singh, Secretary, NFCH in the live TV show "Good Evening India" on 30th November 2017 to emphasize the importance of this celebration and other initiatives to achieve the noble objectives of the Foundation. The Secretary, NFCH explained about various initiatives undertaken by the Foundation and shared the future plans and activities to be undertaken by the Foundation.

32. Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya organized competitions on the theme of Indian culture & human values

he Foundation collaborated with the Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti for holding essay, story writing and painting competitions on a large scale amongst children of 588 Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya from 15th December 2017 to 20th January 2018 at school, cluster, regional and national level in the country to promote communal harmony and national integration. NFCH provided cash prizes along with certificates to the winner children of various competitions.

33. NFCH Supported Vinayak Missions Research Foundation for organizing programme on "Interfaith and Religious Tolerance" at Chennai on 21.12.2017 Department of Biotechnology, Aarupadai Veedu Institute of Technology, Vinayaka Mission's Research Foundation, (Deemed to be University), Salem, Tamil Nadu has organized one day programme on "Interfaith and Religious Tolerance" on 21st December 2017 at their Campus in Chennai. NFCH provided Rs. 27,886/- as financial support for organizing the event.

34. Two days National Conference on 'Interfaith Dialogue on Communal Harmony and National Integration' in collaboration with NFCH in the Magadh University Campus

The Foundation organized two days National Conference on Interfaith Dialogue on Communal harmony and National Integration in collaboration with Magadh University, Bodhgaya on 9th & 10 March 2018. Secretary, NFCH participated as Guest of Honour on the occasion. About 150 participants attended the above programme. The Foundation provided Rs 1,00,000/- for organizing this event.

35. NFCH collaborated with Amity University for organizing One day Essay and Debate Competition cum National workshop at Amity University, Noida NFCH in collaboration with Amity School of Natural Resources and Sustainable Development, Amity University, Noida organized a One day Essay and Debate Competition cum National Workshop on "The Role of Communal Harmony for Sustainable"

Development of the Indian Society" on 13th March 2018. The Foundation provided Rs 80,000/- for organizing this event. Secretary, NFCH participated as Guest of Honour.

36. Secretary, NFCH visited Lucknow for assessment of Project Assist from 22nd to 24th January 2018

Secretary, NFCH visited Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh to review and discuss the progress of Project 'Assist' scheme of the Foundation and coverage of new children in the scheme in Uttar Pradesh State, with the State Government Authorities from 22nd to 24th January 2018.

37. Secretary, NFCH visited Jaipur for assessment of Project Assist from 3rd to 5th February 2018 Secretary, NFCH visited Jaipur, Rajasthan to review and discuss the progress of Project 'Assist' scheme of the Foundation and coverage of new children in the scheme in Rajasthan State, with the State Government Authorities from 3rd to 5th February 2018.

IV - OTHER DETAILS ABOUT NFCH

Website

38. The web-site of the Foundation (www.nfch.nic.in) was launched during 2002-2003. The website includes all the requisite information about the Foundation and its current activities, details of assisted children-including financial assistance released to them, books, journals, publications available in the library, application forms for grant of assistance under various projects, information regarding National Communal Harmony Awards, photo gallery, citizen's charter, RTI and information about organized seminars, rallies, etc.

Staff

39. As on 31.03.2018, the Foundation had total staff strength of 16 personnel including one helper appointed on daily wage basis.

Donation

40. Year-wise break up of donations received from 1992-93 to 2017-18 is at Fig. 6. Total donation of Rs.5.78 Crore was received during 2017-18. The spirit of generous cooperation shown by PSUs / PSEs, corporate houses, individuals, organizations, etc. in giving donations for the noble cause is thankfully acknowledged. Despite our desire, it is difficult to enlist all of our supporters in the Annual Report. Those who have contributed Rs.20,000 or more are listed at Annex-IV.

- 41. Some of the Central Public Sector Enterprises donated sizeable amounts as indicated against each in the above-referred Annex-IV for supporting various activities of the Foundation.
- 42. The Foundation has signed MoU with PowerGrid Corporation of India Ltd. for sponsoring assistance to children covered under project 'Assist'. As per the MoU, the PowerGrid has released funds amounting to Rs.1,69,62,000/- to the Foundation for providing assistance to the needy children/ beneficiaries in Baska, Darrang, Dhubri, Kokrajhar, Nagaon, Nalbari districts of Assam; and Bishnupur, Imphal East, Imphal West, Senapati, Thoubal, Ukhrul districts of Manipur for their rehabilitation.





43. NFCH has signed MoU with the Gail India Ltd. (GAIL) for Rs. 75.00 Lakh for providing assistance to the children/ beneficiaries under Project Assist in Barpeta, Bongaigaon, Cachar, Chirang, Dibrugarh, Dima Hasso (N.C. Hills), Goalpara, Golaghat, Kamrup Rural, Kamrup Metropolitan, Morigaon, Lakhimpur, Sonitpur, Udalguri & Tinsukia districts of Assam; Doda & Kishtwar districts of Jammu & Kashmir and Kandhamal district of Odisha. Out of the total sanctioned amount, they have released Rs. 37.50 Lakh in 2017-18

V- ACCOUNTS AND AUDIT

- 44. The rules of the Foundation provide for the maintenance of proper accounts and other relevant records. The Foundation is also required to prepare an annual statement of accounts and get it audited by a chartered accountant or a firm of chartered accountants approved by the Governing Council.
- 46. M/s AAJ & Associates, New Delhi has audited the accounts of the Foundation for the year 2017-18. The Auditor's Report is placed at Annex-VIII. Audited statement of Accounts and the Auditor's Report of the year 2017-18 has been approved by AS & FA (Home) on File No. 13/3/2018-NFCH.

Year-wise expenditure on project 'Assist' from 1992-93 to 2017-18









OFFICE MEMORANDUM

Subject: Observance of Flag Day by the National Foundation for Communal Harmony - Participation of Government Servants-CCS (Conduct) Rules 1964.

Under Rule 12 of the Central Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1964 no Government servant shall, except with the previous sanction of the Government or of the prescribed authority, ask for or accept contribution to or otherwise associate himself with the raising of any funds or other collections in cash or in kind in pursuance of any object whatsoever.

The National Foundation for Communal Harmony has been set up for promoting communal harmony and particularly for the physical and psychological rehabilitation of children rendered orphans and destitutes in communal violence. The Foundation has been engaging in efforts to collect contributions and observes every year a 'Fund Raising Week', and 'Flag Day', clarifications have been sought whether Central Government Servants could be associated with or involved in the above fund raising efforts of the Foundation.

The matter has been examined and keeping in view the objectives of the National Foundation for Communal Harmony, the Government of India have decided to relax the provisions of Rule 12 to allow Central Government servants to participate in the fund raising efforts of the Foundation on a voluntary basis.

1. Accounting Convention

- The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention and in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles and standards.
- The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis unless otherwise indicated.
- Assistance to children, Awards and fellowships, are accounted as and when paid.
 No provision is made for future installments of assistance to be provided to the children covered under the scheme of project "Assist".

2. Grant/Subsidies

- Government grants/subsidies are accounted for on realization basis.
- Government grants of the nature of contribution towards capital cost of setting up projects are treated as capital reserve.
- Grants in respect of specific fixed assets acquired are shown as a deduction from the cost of related assets.
- At present, the foundation collects and maintains details using dedicated software.
 One consolidated entry for all the donations is passed at the end of each month or year in the account books. In view of this, itemized of each entry from the bank accounts of the foundation was not found practical.
- Categorization of Grants/Donations among Government Agencies, Institution, Welfare bodies and individuals (Schedule-7) is based on the coding system developed in software used for maintaining donor details. Grants are included in donations and not identified separately.

3. Anonymous Donations

 Anonymous donations of Rs. 75,32,627.51/- represents direct deposit of cash/ instruments in the bank account of foundation. Names and other details are not available with the foundation.

4. Activities of the foundation

- The foundation is an autonomous organization under the aegis of Ministry of Home Affairs and has been registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 in the year 1992.
- The main activities of the foundation include providing assistance to children affected by communal disharmony and other promotional activities for communal harmony in the country.
- Expenditure on such activities is shown in Schedule-11 to the Income & Expenditure Account.

5. Inventory Valuation

 Inventories, which consist of NFCH Publications are stated at lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost of inventories is determined using first in first out (FIFO) formula.

6. Investments

- There are no Ear marked funds. Corpus and surplus funds are kept invested in medium term government securities or Bank FDRs (Shown as "Other Investment") to generate fixed income (interest) to take care the core activities of the foundation.
- Investments are stated at cost. Interest accrued thereon is shown under "Loans, advances and other assets".

7. Tangible fixed assets

- Fixed assets are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The cost comprises purchase price and directly attributable cost of bringing the assets to its working condition for intended use. Further, any trade discounts, rebates or input credits are deducted in arriving at the purchase price.
- Subsequent expenditure related to an item of fixed asset is added to its book value only if it increases the future benefits from the existing asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance. All other expenses on existing fixed assets, including day to day repair and maintenance expenditure and cost of replacing parts are charged to the statement of profit and loss for the period during which such expenses are incurred.
- No fixed assets have been received by way of non monetary grants.

8. Cash Payments

The foundation releases advances and expenses through bearer cheques. These
withdrawals are debited to advance or expenses, as the case may be. No payments
are made out of cash in Hand or recorded in cash book at any stage.

9. Depreciation on tangible assets

- Depreciation on fixed assets is calculated on written down value basis using the rates prescribed in rules under Income Tax Act, 1961.
- Assets costing Rs. 5000 or less each are fully depreciated in the year of Purchase.

10. Foreign currency transactions

- There are no foreign currency transactions during the FY 2016-17.
- There are no foreign currency assets or liabilities.

11. Retirement benefits

• Liability towards gratuity payable on death/retirement of employees and for accumulated leave encashment benefit to the regular employees is provided for on accrual basis. The provision is being made in accordance with Government of India rules for calculation of Gratuity and Leave encashment since FY 2007-08.

12.Employees

- Expenses on Employees' Retirement and Terminal Benefits (Schedule-12) include provision for Leave Encashment and Gratuity liability.
- The Foundation follows Central Government rules mutatis mutandis in respect of salary fixation of regular employees including contract employed and re employed retired Government servants. The Foundation pays the salary in accordance with Seventh Pay Commission in respect of such employees.
